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

PACIFIC COAST NOTES. CULLED FROM LATEST WESTERN

At San Luis Obispo, Cal., July 2nd, Micnael Sullivan dropped dead with-out any apparent warning. He was at one of the hotels when suddenly a gush of blood came from his mouth and he fell and expired. He was a native of Ireland and about 40 years of age.

In Los Angeles, early on the morning of the 2nd, as a gentleman coming up town for medicine for his sick wife passed the corner of Second and Olive streets two men stepped from behind a tree and hit him with a sandbag. He was prostrated, but immediately regained his feet. One of the rebbers then drew a pistol and fired point blank at him, but missed; they then

Deceased came to Butte a fortnight ago from Denver for the purpose of closing out his business in this city, and was to have disposed of his interest to-day to his partner, Mr. Boyce. He is reputed to be a millionaire. No cause for the deed is directly assignable, though it is reported that Mr. Sands lost heavily in cattle during the past severe winter, and that finan-cial trouble affected his brain.

"As is well known, the deceased young Elder lately returned from a mission to Germany, which he faithfully performed Quite recently he was set apart to act as a home missionary in the Salt Lake Stake of Zion, and filed his first appointment in that capacity a week ago last Sunday. He had been given another for last Sabbath, but the call from the Lord to labor in another sphere prevented his filling it." His remains were followed to their resting place in the city cemetery by a large cortege, consisting of

some 45 vehicles, while a number walked to the graveyard to be present at th last solemn rites. It was estimated that 25 more vehicles could have been filled by those desiring to go to the cemetery. His brothers and "half brothers" affectionately acted acted as pall bearers. At the interment, that matchless funeral hymn, "The Resurrection Day" was sung by the choir, after which the grounds were consecrated and the grave was closed and covered with boquets of flowers. The contributions of oice flowers by loving hearts and hands were very profuse and beautiful. They wer made up in the form of the cross, harp wreath, stars, pillow, boquets, etc. The harp was the gift of the young ladies of the First Ward Choir, most of whom attended the funeral dressed in white. The large flowery pillow was a loving tribute from

three cousin sisters. Samuel White Musser was, in every sense, a clean and upright young man. His unselfishness was oftentimes exhibited in his love for all his father's children, whom he esteemed alike with brotherly affection and interest. Soon after his return from Germany he said to his father: "I wish I had as many more brothers and sisters, I would gladly help to clothe, feed and edu-

He was a strict observer of the Word of Wisdom, and was humble, prayerful, tractable, and earnestly devoted to his parents, whose counsels he took a pride in observing. His letters from Germany to his father during his incarceration in the Utah Penitentiary were very touching and assuring. To his sister he wrote: "I am so glad that father went to the penitentiary so willingly for his conscientious convictions. This to me is a strong | roof of his unflinching in-

Samuel was naturally bright, promising and amiable. Having attended the Provo Academy and the Deseret University, he was pretty well advanced in schoolastic attainments; and while it will be exceedingly hard for his parents to wholly recover from the great loss sustained by his early demise, there can be no doubt but what Samuel White Musser is infinitely better of and in circumstances to provide the champion Dyspeptic of inding something that would afford off and in circumstances to perform a much greater and more effective work in behalf of relatives and others than if he had remained on this side. SCARCITY OF WATER.

io Sprinkling Allowed Between Eight in the Morning and Six in the Afternoon.

To the Water Takers: The extremely low stage of water in City Creek renders it necessary that special attention be given at this season to the following provisions of the ordinance in relation to waterworks:

SEC. 11. If any water taker shall waste water, or allow it to be wasted hy negligence, such as imperfect stops, or valves, or leaky joints or pipes, or allowing tanks to leak or to overflow, or wastefully run it through basins or other apparatus, or use the water for purposes other than those for which they have paid, or in violation of the rules and regulations for controlling the water supply and the provisions. the water supply, and the provisions of this ordinance, he shall be liable to a fine of not to exceed twenty-five dollars for each offense, and the water may be cut off from such water taker, and all payments forfeited, unless such persons shall promptly pay such addi-tional charges as may be imposed by the superintendent.

SEC. 15. Sprinklers for lawns, gardens, yards and sidewalks must be used only for the purpose paid for; and no sprinkler shall be used for sprinkling the street or sidewalk, unless such privilege is paid for accordingly. Sprinklers for lawns, sidewalks, streets, windows and fronts must be used only between the hours of 6 p. m. and 8 a. m. during the months of July and August. No nozzle for sprinkling shall be larger than one-fourth of an inch in diameter, and no sprinkling shall be allowed except. no sprinkling shall be allowed except in connection with other water service.

The efficiency of the water service demands that these provisions shall be rigidly enforced. Take notice and govern yourselves accordingly.


