## PLIGHT OF IDAHO FLOCKMASTERS.

Sheep in Bad Condition Through Severity of Winter and Scant Feed.

## TO RESIST IDAHO EXCLUSION.

Miss Ella Galsford Is Sent to Asylum—Weber River Gun Club Organized—Junction City News Briefs.

Ogden, March 28.—Attorney C. C. Richards, who has been in Idaho on important business, has returned, and gives a very discouraging report of the condition of the sheep now being cared for in the Snake River valley and other parts of the state. The winter has been a very severe one and the sheep have had to be fed for upwards of five months on hay, the snow being so deep that they could not winter out but little. These conditions have exhausted the stock of hay and other feed the sheep raisers had on hand; and some of the owners of large flocks have been unable to find more hay and have therefore been compelled to feed their sheep on straw, and should the stormy weather continue for another week, he believes a great loss will be sustained by the sheep men for the want of food for their flocks. Indications are also that the clip of wool this spring will be a great deal lighter than in previous years, for the sheep are, as a general rule, very poor.

The sheep owners of Utah are becoming intensely interested in the outcome of the controversy between them and the Idaho officials, as it means that the exclusion regulation barring Utah sheep from Idaho unless they have been previously dipped will have to be fought out in the courts. Recently, Kuchler and J. V. Morgan, who at Boise, Ida., took part in the controversy and Attorney Maginnis and Orr have been employed to defend the sheep owners' interests.

## MISS GALSFORD COMMITTED TO ASYLUM.

Miss Galsford of Second street, Ogden, was committed to the state mental hospital yesterday afternoon by Judge Howell, who, together with Drs. Baker and Powers, examined the young lady and her sanity and adjudged her insane.

The young ladies' case is very unusual in many ways. She has been living with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Brown, and up until a few months ago was well and kind to them. Recently, however, she has changed and at times abused the aged couple, who did all they could for her. Monday evening, Mr. Brown stated, while the family sat at the supper table, the young lady went over to the other side of the room to get something, when the girl jumped up and pushed her grandmother down, and threw a cushion at her grandfather and grabbed him by the head, and they feared she would do some bodily harm when suffering from one of her sudden fits of insanity. The physicians believe that a few months at the state mental hospital will do her a great deal of good.

## WEBER RIVER GUN CLUB.

Articles of incorporation of the "Weber River Gun Club" have been filed with the county clerk. The incorporators are all residents of Hooper. The business purpose of the company will be to operate and maintain a sportsman's club, and to lease, sell, own and control real and personal property and water rights, for the purpose of maintaining a shooting preserve, with all the appurtenances thereunto. The company is capitalized for \$500, divided into shares of the par value of \$25 each. The officers elected for the ensuing year are: Lorenzo Olson, president; Joseph E. Garner, vice president; J. H. Garner, secretary; Charles Garner, treasurer.

## SPECIAL COUNCIL SESSION.

Repeals Bonding Ordinance and Transacts Other Business.

Special Correspondence. Provo, March 28.—The city council met in special session last evening and passed an ordinance repealing the ordinance providing for the issuance of water and artificial light bonds, and rescinding all action of the council relating to the issuance of said bonds.

An ordinance relating to the licensing of liquor dealers, making the license expire with the expiration of the municipal year or quarter thereof, was passed.

An ordinance requiring managers of theaters to notify the chief of fire department of performances, and requiring the chief to detail two firemen to attend each performance, passed its first reading. The ordinance was recommended for further consideration.

The Utah County Canning company petitioned for the extension of the water mains to the company's plant. Referred to the committee on waterworks.

The city marshal was instructed to have all streets in the southeast part of the city opened.

The time for traveling sidewalks was extended 30 days from April 1.

## THE THISTLE CUTTING AFFAIR.

Homer O. Karr, the man who was cut on the throat by L. L. Collier at Thistle Tuesday and is now at the Provo general hospital, will recover and is now able to talk about the affair which came near costing him his life. Sheriff Harman and County Attorney Anderson visited him yesterday after they had been to Thistle to investigate the trouble at that end. He corroborated the story told to the officers, there, by his Collier and witnesses of the fight between the two men. It is that Mr. Karr asked Mr. Collier to retract a statement made in a report to the Salt Lake office of the railroad company about Karr. This Collier refused to do, and Karr struck him, the men then clinched and in the struggle Collier with a razor which Collier had in his pocket. In view of this state of facts, it is possible Collier may not be arrested, the evidence seeming to show that he acted in self defense. The men are not brothers-in-law as reported; they stand well in the little community at Thistle.

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## JEALOUS LOVER'S DEED.

Shoots Couple From Ambush and Then Commits Suicide.

Dallas Tex., March 28.—Will T. Walker, of Ardmore, I. T., waylaid Grover Record and Miss Myrtle Smith last night as they were returning from a skating rink, shot them both and then killed himself. The weapon used was a pistol and four shots were fired, three at the couple and one at himself. Record and Miss Smith were brought to the hospital. The men had both been going to see Miss Smith, but had been friendly in their rivalry. Miss Smith refused to skate with Walker at a roller skate rink. Walker was a railroad man.

## NEGRO SHOTS WHITE MAN.

San Francisco, March 28.—Clark Magee, a negro, tonight deliberately shot, and probably killed a white man, John Walsh, by name, for having, as the negro alleges, despoiled his home. Magee then, turning his gun on his wife, fired a second shot, which went wide.

## DELANCY NICOLS CALLS W. R. HEARST A TRAITOR.

New York, March 28.—Delancy Nicol, vice chairman of the Democratic national committee, in a sensational speech last night at the Democratic club, with August Belmont presiding, denounced Representative William R. Hearst as a political traitor. The attack came as a surprise. He charged Mr. Hearst with accepting the hospitality of the Democratic national committee, using the committee's money and then stabbing the candidates of the party in the back.

At the same time that he denounced Hearst he eulogized William J. Bryan, describing him as an honorable man, and holding Hearst up in contrast with Bryan.

He said among other things: "When I recall the treacherous record of this man Hearst, I am compelled to contrast it with the honorable record of William J. Bryan. I know a true Democrat from a false one. Mr. Bryan did his best with his great eloquence and the power of his great personality after he was defeated in the convention, to elect the candidates of his party.

"He could not control all his friends, and we knew when he went on the stump that he would not be able to control them, but he did not sneak into our headquarters with promises of fealty to our common cause and take our money and put out his banner under our banner, and then inspire his emissaries to stab the party's candidates in the back. I was talking with Mr. Belmont tonight and he said I had better not go very deeply into this matter. But I'm not a politician; I'm not looking for anything in politics, and can afford to tell the truth."

When Mr. Nicol concluded, Mr. Belmont, as toastmaster, said: "In the last part of Mr. Nicol's speech he said he was speaking for himself, and that I did not prompt him. All in favor of that part of his speech in which he says I did not prompt him say 'Aye.'"

The ayes had it amid laughter.

## EX-MAYOR VAN WYCK MARRIED.

New York, March 28.—Robert A. Van Wyck, former mayor of New York, and Kate E. Hertie, the former wife of John C. Hertie, commissioner of accounts, were married Monday night in a new Broadway tabernacle by Rev. Dr. Charles A. Jefferson. Only intimate friends were present at the ceremony, which was not announced until the former mayor with his bride took passage yesterday for Europe. Asked for details of his marriage, Mr. Van Wyck said he could not tell the truth.

"There are none. We were just married, that's all."

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
