

News Items by Mail.

The Eastern mail arrival on Sunday evening with dates from New York, Boston, Cleveland and other Eastern cities to the 8th, and from Denver to the 12th of June.

The *New Orleans Bee*, of the 23d of May, publishes a list of prizes that had been taken by privateers and brought into that port, and adds:

A number of our prominent citizens own stock in these lucky privateers, and they have never known before such a profitable business. Their investments have been more than doubled in a week, and will probably go on in a like ratio. This great success, too, will give vast encouragement to many capitalists who have not yet embarked in privateering to do so. As the distant squadrons of the United States Navy have been generally recalled, and the North has no war vessels to spare for the protection of its ships, every sea on the globe is a fruitful field for captures, and at the end of the war the South will have a splendid commercial marine of prizes within her own ports.

Many accidents are reported to have occurred among the Federal troops, and men were daily being killed or wounded by the discharge of fire arms, the result of carelessness in their use.

On Wednesday, May 29th, Prince Alfred arrived at St. Johns, N. B., where he was received by the Governor and suite, and the civil authorities. A torchlight procession by firemen was an interesting feature of the reception. The Prince was to leave St. Johns on the 13th for Quebec.

The Southern papers generally represent the crops throughout the Confederate States as being very promising, but refugees, as reported, tell a different story. A man from Texas had reported in Philadelphia, so says one of the Journals, that all through the South provisions were very scarce, and the crops were by no means promising.—Throughout Northern Georgia and Alabama, no rain had fallen for a number of weeks, and fears of a drouth were beginning to be entertained. There was no travel on any of the railroads, except so far as the transportation of troops was concerned, and business of all kinds was completely at a stand-still.

Business at Richmond was said to be dead, and the slaves having nothing to do were becoming expensive, in common parlance of the country, "eating their own heads off."

A Virginian, named Bennet, "tainted with love for his country," was arrested for shoeing United States cavalry horses, somewhere not far from Alexandria, taken to Richmond and tried, and from Richmond was sent to Manassas Junction and hung on the first of June. About the same time one of the New York Firemen Zouaves was shot while on guard duty, three miles from Alexandria, by a scouting trooper from Fairfax, who on discovering the sentinel, dismounted from and tied his horse, and then crept up and shot the Zouave through the head.

Emigrants to Utah.

We have been favored by Mr. James Needham of this city with the following extract from a letter written to him by Mr. A. R. Wright, at Philadelphia, on the 15th ultimo:

"The Saints are pushing out westward as fast as possible: over one thousand souls started, on the 11th inst., from here and New York; and there is another company of the same number arrived in New York from Europe, and will proceed westward immediately."

REMOVAL OF THE POST OFFICE.—On Monday last, the 1st inst., William Bell, Esq., successor to Mr. Morrell, as postmaster, at Salt Lake City, entered upon the discharge of his duties, and removed the post office from the Groesbeck Buildings, to the large Warehouse buildings, north of and adjoining Livingston, Bell & Co's Store, East Temple Street, third door south of the Council House.

The Comet of 1861.

The great comet, so long expected, made its appearance the last of June, in the region of the Great Bear's head. July 1st, at 9:30 p.m., its altitude was 17° 3' 10" n.w., with a great velocity, and a tail 60 degrees long, which, if the comet be now in the plane of Jupiter, would exceed one hundred millions of miles.

Some will call it "the comet of Charles V.," some "the comet of 1811," before the last war with Great Britain, but we shall content ourselves with calling it — Ale-Kol-Kall, "God sustains all," knowing that all that has been predicted concerning the winding up scene of the last days will speedily come to pass after the appearance of this great comet of the first magnitude.
