MINUTES OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE TERRITORY OF UTAH. TWENTY-FIRST SESSION, 1874. COUNCIL.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY HALL,
Salt Lake City, Feb. 2, 1874.

Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Councilor Hooper, pursuant to notice given on Saturday, presented C. F. 23, "An act amendatory of an act to regulate proceedings in civil cases in the Courts of Justice, in this Territory and to repeal certain acts and parts of acts," referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Councilor Jennings, Chairman of the Committee on General Incorporations, to whom was referred C. F. 9, "An act to provide for the formation of Corporations for Public Libraries and Literary and Scientific Institutions," reported the same back amended and recommended its passage as amended.

The bill was read as amended, and passed its second reading as amended, and was ordered engrossed.

Councilor Smoot, Chairman of the Committee on Municipal Incorporations, to whom was referred H. F. 13, "An act incorporating the City of Nephi, in Juab County," reported the same back amended and recommended its passage as amended.

The Council adjourned.

HOUSE.

REPRESENTATIVES' HALL,
February 2nd, 1874.

House met pursuant to adjournment.

On motion of Mr. Mann, the Committee on Agriculture, Trade and Manufactures was instructed to prepare a bill to provide for a Mechanics' and Laborers' Lien.

Mr. Merrill presented a petition of John Blair and 82 others, residents of Richmond City, Cache County, praying for a change of the boundary lines of said city, which was read and referred to the Committee on Municipal Corporations, &c.

Mr. Roundy presented a petition from Judge Willis and 168 other citizens of Kane County, praying for an appropriation of \$5,000 to assist in making a road from Shonesburg to Long Valley, which was read and referred to the Committee on Claims and Appropriations.

Mr. Murdock presented a bill for an act to incorporate Wasatch College, which was read and referred to the Committee on Private Incorporations, &c.

Mr. Merrill presented Financial Report of Cache County; referred to the Committee on Revenue.

(H. F. 20.) An act amendatory of, and supplementary to, the charter of Beaver City was passed.

Mr. W. W. Cluff presented a bill for "An act amending 'An act further amending an act prescribing the manner of assessing and collecting taxes,' &c., which was read and referred to the Committee on Revenue.

Mr. Rockwood moved that said Committee on Revenue be instructed to take into consideration the propriety of amending the revenue law in relation to the assessment of ores on the dump, also the assessment of railroads, incorporated companies, &c. Seconded and carried.

The following was received and read:

To the Honorable the House of Representatives.

GENTLEMEN:—I most respectfully submit the following motion, to wit:

That this House respond to invitation of United States Centennial Commission, in common with other States and Territories, by the appointment of a Board of Managers to make the necessary preparations for a proper representation at the Centennial Celebration of American Independence in the city of Philadelphia in 1876, conformably to suggestion in the message of His Excellency the Governor pertaining thereto.

On motion of Mr. Rock-

wood, the subject matter of the Centennial Commission was referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Trade and Manufactures.

Mr. Peacock presented a petition of Canute Peterson and fifty-two other citizens of Ephraim City, in Sanpete county, asking for the passage of the accompanying bill for "An act amending an act entitled 'An act incorporating the city of Ephraim,' approved Feb. 14, 1868, which was read and referred to the Committee on Municipal Corporations, &c.

Mr. Rockwood moved that the Committee on Revenue be instructed to have the reports of the Territorial officers as well as financial reports of the different counties printed as soon as practicable. Seconded and carried.

House adjourned till 2 p.m. to-morrow.

Council met pursuant to adjournment.

H. F. No. 20, "An act amendatory of and supplementary to the charter of Beaver City," was taken up on its first reading, whereupon Councilor Caine presented the following motion, which was carried:

I move that H. F. No. 20, "An act amendatory of and supplementary to the charter of Beaver City," be referred to the Committee on Municipal Corporations and Townsites, with instructions to provide for the election, by the people, of the officers created by section 8, instead of being appointed by the City Council, and to so alter the bill as to carry out this suggestion, and that the usual number of copies be printed.

Councilor Jennings gave notice that on Wednesday he would present a bill for an act creating a Board of Managers for the Territory of Utah, to co-operate with the National Board of Centennial Commissioners for the Centennial Exhibition, to be held in the city of Philadelphia, July, 1876.

Councilor Thatcher pursuant to notice given presented C. F. No. 24, "An act concerning Escheats," referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Councilor Gates presented the petition of A. F. Macdonald and 200 others asking for an appropriation of \$2,000, to be applied in improving the road from the Black Ridge in Kane County to Harrisburg in Washington County; referred to Committee on Revenue.

Councilor Harrington, Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary to whom was referred C. F. 12, "An Act requiring compensation for causing death by wrongful act, neglect or default," reported the same back and recommended that it be put upon its passage. Amended.

Councilor Stayner presented bill for services of Wm. Brown and deputies in arrest of Bob Bloom, July, 1872; referred to the Committee on Claims and Appropriations.

C. F. No. 9, "An act to provide for the formation of Corporations for Public Libraries and Literary and Scientific Institutions," was passed.

On motion of Councilor Thatcher passed its third reading by its title.

The Council adjourned.

House met pursuant to adjournment.

Mr. Rockwood presented report of the Directors of the Utah Penitentiary, with accompanying Warden Report, which were read and referred to the Committee on Penitentiary, and sixty copies of same ordered printed.

Mr. Taylor presented Financial Report of Salt Lake County, which was referred to the Committee on Revenue.

Mr. Murdock presented petition of officers of the Second District Court for an appropriation to have records indexed, which was read and referred to the Committee on Claims and Appropriations.

H. F. 18, "A bill for an Act pertaining to certain animals running at large, and requiring Pound keepers to brand animals sold by them, and for other purposes," was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Mr. Farr, Chairman of Commit-

tee on Judiciary, to whom was referred (H. F. 15), "An act pertaining to fees for the Secretary of the Territory," reported back said bill and recommended its passage.

Said bill, (H. F. 15), "An act pertaining to fees for the Secretary of the Territory," was taken up on its second reading, amended and passed.

The House adjourned till 2 p.m. to-morrow.
