LOCAL BRIEFS.

August Gattiker, formerly of Switzerland, but now a resident of this city, has been admitted to citizenship by Judge Armstrong.

Judge Willis Brown of the Juvenile court will deliver an address in the Nineteenth ward meetinghouse on next Sunday evening at 8:30 o'clock.

A large photograph of the senior "gym" class at the Y. M. C. A. has been taken, and is displayed in the lobby of the association building.

The new guard house at Fort Douglas has been so far completed that the prisoners have been removed from the old "cellar" to the new and more palatial quarters.

There will be a civil service examination in this city August 22, for the position of bookkeeper in the Panama reserve, at \$100 to \$125 per month; age limit, 18 to 40 years.

The fees of the county clerk's office for the month of July amounted to \$2,394.45 as against \$2,022.65 for the same month last year, making an increase this month of \$371.80.

The rush of tourists "continues with unabated fury," and the hotels are full to overflowing. The hotel clerks have their hands full and the liveliest places in town are the hotel lobbies.

Surg-Maj. Allen M. Smith of Fort Douglas has gone to the Strawberry valley for duty with the troops in the field, and Asst. Surg. Keller has returned from the field to the post for duty.

Hot weather and low water in the streams of the state are having a bad effect on the fish in the valleys so that it is reported that they are dying in large numbers, particularly along the Weber river, and Lost and Chalk creeks.

The department employees of the city were paid yesterday by the city treasurer for the last half of July. The amount of the payrolls is \$1,492.88. This is also paid day for the county employees so that they will have some circumspect money too.

There is an increased demand for butter reported among the local dealers, the wholesale price of which in consequence is advanced from 20 to 25 cents. The supply is shortening, as is generally the case at this time of the year on account of the hot weather which dries up the pastures.

Reports from Los Angeles state that Landlord Fred Wey of the Wilson hotel, has under consideration an offer to engage in a hotel enterprise in the Angel city, in the erection of a hotel of 500 rooms at Fifth and Spring streets. Mr. Wey's success as a hotel keeper in this city has given him an enviable reputation in the business over the west.

J. Kodak Smith of Castle Gate, is at the Wilson. He says that there is no excitement to speak of in his part of the country over the Utah reservation opening, and very few people will try for a homestead route east from a trip to San Francisco.
