St. Louis, Nov. 3 .- George E. Hall of Kansas City was today arrested by a deputy United States marshil on the charge of having obtained a fee of \$2 each from 200 laborers for securing them employment and then sending them to Alaska at their own sending them to Alaska at their own expense to work for a construction company that did not exist. The spe-cific charge against bim is that he used the mails to derenud. It is alleged that Hall represented himself to be an employer of tabor for the Alaska-Yukon Construction company; that he secured 200 laborers to go. to Yaldez, Alaska, and after collecting \$27 from each-32 as his fee and \$25 for trans-portation expenses-he sent them to Alaska. Inspector Bennett declares that when the laborers reached their destination they learned that there was festination they learned that there was no such company as the one mamed, ind they made their way back as best they could, after much suffering and hardship.

The unprecedented falling off in the erg production for this year, ex-perts believe is due to the fact that the states of Oregon and Washington can not agree upon the length of the fishing season, and its long duration and con-sequent overfishing has so curtailed the supply of hatchery fish that unless immediate action is taken by the two states in the matter the future of the 15,000,000 eggs this year in the face of immediate action is taken by the two states in the matter the future of the fish caraning industry will be problem-atical. North Sea Court of Inquiry

St. Petersburg, Nov. 4, (1:20 a. m.)-Negotiations regarding the North Sea court of inquiry have not yet been con-cluded. The Associated Press is inermed that the present position is as follows

"The terms of the draft of the treaty for the constitution of the court are under consideration by the emperor. who may desire some modifications, in which case re-submission of the draft to London will, of course, he necessary but the amendments, if any, are not expected to be of importance. One of the points already agreed on is that Great Britain and Russia will jointly propose that France and the United States appoint a high naval officer as a member of the court, which probably will sit in Paris." The four officers of the Russian Bal-tic squadron who, it was originally ar-

ranged, were to remain in Paris until the arrival of Admiral Kaznakoff, before coming to St. Petersburg to present the report of Vice Admiral Rojestvensky to the emperor.
