A Foul Place.—Last night several parties having rooms in what is called the Benites building, near the corner of Second South and First East Streets, were arrested for lewd conduct and prostitution. The tenement referred to is a foul nest of immorality that requires cleaning out like any other unbearable nuisance.

United.—Wm. T. Jack, of the 1st Ward, was married to Ellen M. Naylor, eldest daughter of the late Thomas Naylor 18th Ward, on Thursday, June 21st, by President Joseph F. Smith. In the evening the happy event was celebrated at the house of the bride's Mother, by a meeting of friends and relatives, including the Bishops of each of the Wards named.

Broken Flumes.—A short time since a flume was placed in the ditch crossing Fifth South Street, on Third West, a few rods east of the C. C. Railway, Sixth Ward station platform, but was not covered over. The passing of loaded wagons over it has broken it to such an extent as to make the crossing impassable with a load. As there is considerable traffic along that street, the same should be repaired immediately. One block east of this, at the end of the Sixth Ward street car line, the flume is also badly broken, making it difficult to cross.

Another New House.—The good people of the Third Ward are about to begin the erection of a handsome new meeting house, the site of which will be immediately west of the school house; a piece of land having been purchased for the purpose. We have seen the plan, which was drawn by Theo. J. Angell. The building will face south, with a veranda on that end 9x8 feet. The main structure will be 50x25 feet, with abutments surrounding. Inside, the space from floor to ceiling will be 17 feet. The material will be brick. The building committee are, Bishop Weier, E. M. Weier, G. Stringfellow, John Wayman and John Y. Smith. It is expected that work will be begun on the building at an early day.

Bishop Evans.—It will be observed by the following that there is but little prospect of recovery of Bishop Evans, one of Utah's veterans:

A Remarkable Invention.—An-dersen Olsen, a Norwegian, aged 39 years, formerly a seaman, has developed a very interesting and extraordinary invention, for which he obtained a patent about two years ago. The principle is for application in the construction of vessels of all dimensions, from a small boat to a mammoth steamer, which will not only be safe from wreck, but will cut through waves of any size instead of riding over them, thus obviating the plunging motion that produce sea-sickness. The keel is entirely dispensed with, the part that goes into the water being two long, hollow cylinders, pointed at the ends. From these rise a row of perpendicular cylinders, also hollow, to support the body of the vessel. Upon these upright cylinders rests the platform of the ship, upon which can be built any style of architecture that may be desired.

Mr. Olsen has already built a small boat as a model, which will be placed somewhere on Salt Lake, for the purpose of an experiment by which the principle of his invention will be tested. His theory has every appearance of feasibility. If it works all right, it will create a revolution in the matter of ocean and other vessels. Mr. Olsen's patent includes the whole country, England and France. It is for "a fireproof, unsinkable pontoon steamboat."

Editor Deseret News:

It is with sorrow that I inform you of the precarious condition of my father, Bishop David Evans, who is suffering from the effects of a paralytic stroke, which occurred Tuesday, June 19th. For several days previous he felt unwell, and had a numb feeling in the right arm and leg; but on the day mentioned, about 1 o'clock p.m., he received a heavy stroke which paralyzed his whole right side, and affected his speech. Since then he has been as helpless as a child, and is not able to speak a word or take any nourishment. Little hope is entertained for his recovery, though he may linger along for several days.
