Secretary Robert M. Bates Answer to Your Inquiry.

AS TO E. N. JORDAN AT HAWAII.

They Were Placed at Honolulu's Disposal Because He Knew the Government's Policy, and Could Carry it Out.

Washington, March 10.—Secretary Bates has made response to the Honolulu letter in the House, calling on him to state his authority for the sending of instructions to the naval forces at Honolulu, and the status of the Hawaiian Islands.

The secretary explains his reply by stating that instructions to Admiral Porter and the naval forces at Honolulu were given by the President, and that the secretary's authority for sending the order was the President's command in chief of the army and navy, and he is a member of the President's cabinet.
