Permanent Home for Chinese Minister Washington, March 14.—The Chinese government has decided to have a per-manent home here for its legation, and Minister Wu Ting Fang today record-ed a deed by which there is transferred to the Chinese the second to the Chinese imperial government a building site at Nineteenth and Vernon streets, in the northwestern sec-tion of the city, the consideration nam-ed being \$15,870. A residence for the minister and the officers of the legation will be enacted will be erected.

Catholic Policy in Philippines.

Washington, March 14,--All commun-ication between the vatican authorities and the government regarding the friar question in the Philippines has been made independently of the apostolic delegation in this city. No instruc-tions or communications whatever on the subject have reached here for M. Sbarretti now en route from Naples, and who, according to cable dispatches has been directed to proceed here and await instructions from Rome before going further into the Philippine issue. The apostolic delegation here, accord-

ing to authoritative information has never been communicated with by Rome on Cuban or Porto Rican matters ex-cept in one instance. That instance was when the vatican wired the dele-gation that "It had been determined to

send a high ecclesiastic who had the confidence of the American government confidence of the American government to take charge of the affairs of the church in Cuba and Porto Rico and possibly later in the Philippines." This announcement, which referred to Mgr. Chappel's appointment did not even mention his name. The object of

this silence is not known, though it is assumed to be based on a desire to prelude any allegation in the future that clude any allegation in the future that the delegation has ever sought to in-terfere in any manner with this gov-ernment and its policies. The Catho-lic authorities here are understood to have received assurances that Mgr. Sbarretti is shortly expected at the war department to discuss the friar question, but no word has been re-ceived by Cardinal Martinelli regard-ing Mgr. Sbarretti and nothing is known as to what duties have been or known as to what duties have been or will be entrusted to him.

British Organization for Defense London, March 14 .--- In an address to
