PERU. **AMERICAN.**
Cold Blooded Murder.

CHICAGO, 5.—A dispatch from
Taylorville, Ill., says: A cold blooded
murder was committed a little
north of the town of Palmer. John
Leigh and James Rigby, two farm-
ers quarrelled about the possession
of land, and they became involved
in a law suit, from which Rigby
came out victorious. Yesterday
Leigh approached Rigby, and pre-
tending that he desired to effect a
peaceful settlement, suddenly opened
fire with a revolver. One bullet
struck Rigby in the chest, and he
fell, but a posse was in pursuit,
and as the excitement runs high
lynchings are probable, as murderers
have usually escaped the law in this
region.

The Clipping Found in the Infernal
Machine.

Monday Oct. 31, 1881.—U. S. Cir-
cuit Court, before Judge Field, City
of San Francisco vs. the United
States. Judge Field yesterday de-
livered the following opinion in the
above case. The case came before
this court upon a transfer from the
District Court under an act of Con-
gress July 1st, 1864, to expedite the
title to land in the State of Califor-
nia. It was in the District Court on
an appeal from the Board of Land
Commissioners, created by the Act
of March 3d, 1851. It involves a
consideration of the validity of the
claim asserted by the city of San
Francisco and embracing the whole
of the peninsula upon which the
city is located as well as certain
areas of four square leagues.

It may be prolonged.

WASHINGTON, 5.—The *Jeannette*
board of inquiry spent the entire after-
noon session in organizing and
outlining plans for a thorough and
systematic investigation. The ses-
sions of the board will be open, and
it is at present the intention to ex-
amine every witness who can throw
any light upon the subject. As sev-
eral survivors of the *Jeannette* ex-
pedition are now engaged in the
search for Lieut. Chipp and party,
the present inquiry may be prolonged
several months, to allow the
taking of their testimony.

Criminal Carelessness.
NEW YORK, 5.—The coroner's jury
investigating the responsibility for
the late collision in the Hudson riv-
er tunnel, by which three persons
lost their lives, and W. D. C. Raw-
son, the telegraph operator at the
Ninety-sixth street station, guilty
of culpable negligence; George E.
Rood, the conductor of the New Ha-
ven and Hartford train, guilty of
gross and criminal negligence; John-
son L. Robbins, the brakeman, guilty
of culpable negligence; and the
New York Central and Hudson River
Railroad Company guilty of gross
and criminal negligence.

Disseminated.
KANSAS CITY, 5.—Frank James
surrendered to Gov. Crittenden at
Jefferson City, at 5 o'clock, and he
will be brought here to-morrow and
delivered to the Jackson County au-
thorities. Gov. Crittenden tele-
graphed that the officer leaves to-
night with the prisoner. The offi-
cial express some surprise at
James' action, as no overtures have
been made on their part toward a
surrender. They think he became
discouraged at having lost all of his
old confederates and concluded that
it was useless to attempt longer to
live in outlawry, preferring to trust
to the law to pardon him.

St. Louis, 5.—A special from Jef-
ferson City says: That when Frank
James surrendered to Governor Crit-
tenden he handed him his pistol, and
stated that he (the Governor)
was the only man except himself
who had touched them for twenty
years. Frank is at the McCarty
House this evening, and many pre-
minent citizens are seeking the hon-
or of shaking hands with him.

Stealing for Twenty Years.
PITTSBURGH, 5.—David Barb-
er for many years past general manager
and financial superintendent of the
flouring mills of Marshall, Kennedy
& Co., was arrested on the charge of
stealing. It is alleged that he has
been carrying on a system of robbing
for twenty years, and has taken
about \$25,000.

Yellow Fever.
BROWNSVILLE, 5.—There are nine
new cases here and six new cases in
Matamoros, no deaths. The daily
death rate in Matamoros is eight to twelve.
The weather is hot.

Pennsylvania, 5.—There are 55 new
cases and four deaths. There is no
improvement and no encouragement
to physicians.

A Ballot-Box Snafu.
PHILADELPHIA, 5.—The confes-
sion of Thomas J. Owen, clerk of the
election held in the Alms-house divi-
sion of the Twenty-seventh Ward
last February, in which made in pub-
lic that the absconding
Philippa broke open the ballot-box
and altered the election returns.

The result of this was to defeat two
improvement republicans, and elect
two democrats. The charge of con-
spiracy is said to be framed against
several city officials on the strength
of this confession.

Stumping the State.
LINCOLN, Neb., 5.—The Woman's
Suffrage campaign was opened in
this city yesterday. The Board of Trade
of this city tendered the free use of
their rooms to the State Society
Campaign Committee for head-
quarters until the election in Novem-
ber. Speakers will stump the entire
State, and immense efforts are
making to secure the adoption of
the amendment.

Fatal Accident.
RALEIGH, N. C., 5.—A train on
the Midland & Northern Railroad
was derailed to-day while approach-
ing Goldsboro, and several cars rolled
down the embankment. One man
is reported killed and several passen-
gers injured.

Sued for libel.
PHILADELPHIA, 5.—Mrs. Catharine
Reed, wife of Richard Reed, the
well known poet, whose tragic
death by suicide in the San Fran-
cisco Mint four years ago was the
theme of some general comment
both in this country and England
at the time, appeared to-day in
Judge Mitchell's court as the plain-
tiff in a suit against J. B. Lippincott
& Co. to recover damages for
alleged libelous statements concern-
ing herself in the biography of her
husband written by Rosseter John-
son and printed in Lippincott's
magazine in March, 1879.

PERUVIAN PACE.

Stephen's majority will be about
50,000 in Georgia.

Yesterday in St. Louis 100,000
people were present at the State
fair.

The Filley faction of the republicans
party in St. Louis nominated a full
city ticket yesterday.

Reinhart, a trader, at Urberville,
Canada, has disappeared, and it is
believed he is in default.

Thurlock Weed is very ill in New
York, and his daughter has been
summoned to his bedside.

Yesterday \$440,000 in new gold
certificates were sent to New York
for the signature of the Assistant
Treasurer.

Judge Tarbell, deputy first com-
ptroller of the Treasury, has been for
several days confined to his home
with illness.

Eleven firms of starch manufac-
turers are in conference in Cin-
cinnati, Ohio, with a view to consoli-
dating the business.

Seventeen cases of smallpox on the
Fort Wayne emigrant train from
New York, was discovered by the
health inspector at Chicago yester-
day.

At Tehuantepec, Mexico, yester-
day, Tax Collector Frederico Hubli
was killed, his wife mortally wound-
ed, and his house robbed of \$4,000,
by bandits.

It is reported that Vice-President
David Davis was married early in
November to Miss Addie Burr, of
Warrenton, North Carolina, former-
ly of Como, Illinois.

A concert was given by the
College of Music in Cincinnati, in
which Madge Wickham, a talented
violinist only 14 years old, had a
prominent place on the programme.

George Scoville filed a petition in
the county court of Cook county,
Illinois, yesterday, asking that Mrs.
Scoville be adjudged insane, and
committed to the asylum for lunatics.

Smith & Nixon's hall, the oldest
music hall in Cincinnati, in which
Jenny Lind sang, but which has for
a long time been used by the Cham-
ber of Commerce, was reopened last
evening as a music hall.

At Williamsport, Pa., yesterday,
jury indictments were returned by
the Grand Jury against the mayor
and city council, arrested last week
on the charge of failing to keep the
streets in proper condition.

Acting Secretary of the Treasury
has asked the Attorney-General for
his opinion on the question whether
National banks have a right to cer-
tify and accept checks beyond the
amount on deposit to the credit of
the drawer.

The bank examiners concluded
their examination of the Manufac-
turers National Bank, Troy, N. Y.
The defalcation of Cashier Well-
ington is reported at \$1,415. The ex-
aminers say that the institution is
perfectly sound.

A Kewanee, Illinois special says:
A detective arrived with bank rob-
ber Dunkles to-day and this morn-
ing, after a walk of a few miles east
of here, returned with a sack of gold
containing \$5,000. This accounts
for all the money and all of the rob-
bers are in custody.

The railroad commissioners investi-
gating the collision at Zeon on the
St. Louis Railroad, Mass., Septem-
ber 19, state that the accident caused
the death of three men, and seri-
ously injured two. They charge
conductor Harley on the train with
the grossest carelessness.

At Indianapolis, the State Con-
vention of the Christian Temperance
Union passed a resolution for the
submission of the question of a
prohibitory amendment to a vote of
the people at a special election, and
they resolved to support the candi-
dates advocating this policy regard-
less of party.
