Elder Joseph E. Paylor was the first speaker. He referred to the High Prissi's quorum, one-third of the members of which are presid-siding officers in the Stake and the different wards. The covenants The covenants made by the young men who are ordained Elders, that they will perform their duties faithfully, are of great importance; yet it has been prove. that even the presiding officers al-luded to are negligent in attendance at the High Priests' quorums. Surely, for the sake of their own influence, these men should set a better example.

The origin of our present fas.-day olservances was spoken of, and their object delailed; the statement heing made that the brethren are negligent in attendance at the meetings. He urged the training of children in the principles and practice of faeling, as soon as they are capable of unuerstanding the uniy of sell-sacrifice. The practice of requiring children to engage in prayer in the family oircle was heartily endorsed, as also the duty of parents to see that their children are trained at home in the principles of the Gospel.

He deprecated the tendency mani-tested in theological classes to discuss abstruce questions of doctrine; wisdom would suggest that people should wait until light is given upon those subjects, to set discussion at rest. In conclusion he urged the observance of the Sabtath and the avoidance of extremes in amusement.

In amusement. Elder Asngus M. Cannon, president of the Stake, next addressed the con-gregatior. He emphasized the im-portance of proper examples, for the sake of the children who observe the actions of their elders. Possessed of the knowledge of the work of God and its past accomplishments, the Saints should feel the obligations they are under to those who have sacrificed so much in the work. All the organizations of the Church in the Stake should be properly sustained; and all who hold the Priesthood should have an abiding seuse of their responsibility. Laboring in the name of Christ, they should live so as to be worthy of His spiritual compationship. Their bouse of faith should be built on the rock, not on the sand. The disastrons effect upon the family, of the bypocriey of t e parent, was depicted, and the people were warned against it. Only up complete consistency in this respect can the obtidiren be preserved in the faith through the labor of the parents. Since the blessings of wife and children for eternity are not bestowed except under

sacred family relation are indeed great. And all saurifices point to a glorious consummation of the purposes of God.

The necessity of the Satuts living up to their high calling through the influence of the Holy Ghost, was emphasized, and the faithfulness of all in their several callings was strongly urged. Especial stress was faid on the duty of parents to see that their children receive sufficient of the spirit of God, by attendance upon the various meetings where this influence is shed Nor should instruction and abroad. training in these various duties be postponed until the children are too old to get the fullest benefit from these assoclations. For neglect of this duty the parents will be held accountable and punished in the recreancy of their ohildren.

Faithfulness in the performance of promises even to little children should be strictly observed. So should those appointed to minister to the Saints of God be faithful in the performance of their important duties. If the full responsibility of a position in the Church of Christ were understood, there would be no failure in the performance of any of its duries.

Elder A. H. Cannou, of the Council of the Apostles, spoke of some who thought that God was unjust in His dealing with His ohildren because some are rich while others are poor. God is not upjust. The great d fierence in men and women is because of theirown feelings and determination to succeed. Some make their way under the most us verse circumstances, There seems to be no trial so severe that they will not endure it to succeed in their chosen pursuit. Those who are ifficted in the most serious way are sometimes the ones who succeed the nest. Some people speak the best It is not of men lucky. that follows men them to be suc luck successful. enables them It is determination and perseverance. The reason some men do not succeed is because they will not do as God has commanded.
