U.S. ASSESSOR'S NOTICE.

Assessor's Office, Int. Rev. Dist. of Utah, G. S. L. City, May 28, 1867. Notice is hereby given to all persons concerned, that the assessment valuation, enumeration and income list for the district of the Territory of Utah, in accordance with an Act to provide Internal Revenue to support the Government and to pay interest on the public debt, approved June 30, 1864, as amended by an Act of March 2, 1867, is ready for examination.

For all messages sent from G. S. L. City to Nephi City, south, and Brigham City north, in-cluding intermediate offices, for each message of ten words or less, fifty cents; each additional word 21/2 cents.

For all messages sent from G. S. L. City to all other offices than above mentioned, for each message of ten words, one dollar; each addition-al word, 5 cents.

All other offices of the Line will be gov- IMMENSE erned by the following rates:

For all messages sent from the respective offi-ces to the next nearest office each way, each message of ten words or less, fifty cents, each additional word 21/2 cents,

For all messages sent from the respective offi-ces to all other offices belonging to the Com-pany (Salt Lake City excepted as above) for each message of ten words or less, one dollar; each additional word, 5 cents,

It is hoped by this arrangement to place the benefits and advantages of the line within the benefits and advantages of the line within the reach of every citizen. It will at once be seen by every reflecting mind that prompt payment for business done by the line will be a matter of necessity. We trust all will appreciate this change of prices and prove their appreciation by increased patronage. It is designed at an early day to furnish each operator throughout the Territory with a print-ed tariff of prices to be charged at his office, as the above is a temporary arrangement. 




