Almo, Cassia Co., Ida., July 20.—A trip from Preston via Cache Junction to this place is full of interest. The crops all along the route look very much better than could be expected from so long a term of drouth.

To reach Cassia county, we take train on the Portland division from Pocatello, sixty miles to Minedoea.
