Baron Shibushwa Tells What it Was in Commercial Awakening of His Country.

AMERICANS WELCOME IN EAST

As a Business Man Favors Japanese Exclusion as Emigration of Cheap Labor Injures Home Industry.

Seattle, Wash, Sept. 2-In a statement to the press, Baron Shibusawa, head of the Japanese commercial com mission that arrived here yesterday for a tour of the United States, discusses the part played by America in the commercial awakening of Japan and the feeling of obligation held by the Japanese toward the United States, saying that this feeling is universal in his country. He recounts the celebration that took place when the commissioners sailed from Yokohama, citing it as an example of the interest taken by his countrymen in the mission of peace and commercial good will. Continuing Baron Shibusawa saya!

"It is very interesting to note that while different European nations are talking about the increase of armament and when especially great rulers are exchanging visits accompanied by warships, the Japanese people are perfectly satisfied in sending us plain business men on a peaceful mission to this great commercial country. PREPARATIONS FOR MEETING OF TAFT AND DIAZ

El Paso, Tex. Sept. 1—Presidents Tart and Diaz will be received in this city and in Juavez on their arrival Oct. 16, not only by a magnificent military display, but by 10,000 school children singing the national anthems of the two nations, and by the two most famous bands of Mexico and by at

least two splendid military bands of the United States army, according to the official program being prepared by the committees of arrangements of the two republics, which are co-operating. President Taft will be met at Rincon, N. M. He will be received here by two regiments of United States regulars with the presidential salute of Il guns, and large detachments of national guardamen of Texas on his strival at 8 s. m. at 10.36 will cross the river from Junier and will meet President Taft in a pavilion in front of the chamber of commerce. After a breakfast at the chamber, the two presidents will proceed to Junier Merce Mr. Taft will be the guest of Mexico until 10:15 p. m.

Returning to El Paso, President Taft and calinet officers with him will deliver addresses and review the parada of 10:000 school children and the troops. At 8 o'clock President Taft with his party and distinguished men of both republics will attend a banquet given in their bonor in Juares by President Diez, for which the Mexican government is building a 250-000 addition to their emstoms house and is also spending a nearter of a million dollars for street improvements.

Washington, Sept. 1.-There was deficit of \$.411,728 in the ordinary re-ceipts and disbursements of the treasury department for the month of Aug-ust, as compared with a deficit of \$13,-102.949 for July There was also a smaller deficit in the receipts and dis-bursements for the construction of the Panama canal, the shortage being \$2,-70,213 for July, and \$2,004,127 for Aug-

The public debt less the cash balance The public debt less the cash balance in the treasury at the beginning of business today was \$1,947,527,211. This does not include \$1,343,211,869 in certificates and treasury notes, which is offet by an equal amount of cash in the

reasury.

The statement of the cash in the treasury shows a total of \$1,722,230,121, divided as follows:

Reserve fund, gold coin and buillon, \$150,000,000; trust funds, \$1,343,211,869, to offset certificates and treasury notes; general fund, \$169,004,234; in autional bank depositories, \$54,022,746, and in the treasury of the Philippine islands, \$5,901,271.

GOMPERS ADDRESSES TRADES UNIONS CONGRESS

Paris, Sept. 1—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, addressed the International Trades Unions congress again today. He denounced international strike reaking and declared the systemati mmigration of workmen in time of depression and strikes in other coun-ties to be one of the greatest menaces

tries to be one of the greatest menaces of organized labor.

Mr. Gompers proposal for organizing an international federation of workmen could not be discussed, because the American Federation of Labor is not affiliated with the European unions but a British resolution of the same import was adopted. The conference then passed a resolution against workmen offering their services at times when dockmen and stevedores strike. The conference adjourned to meet at Buda Pest in 1911.


