If he makes good with Sharkey and proves to the public that he is worthy of a match with Jeffries he won't have much trouble in being accommodated. "Jeffries is the champion, and he has always been prepared to defend his title satalt all comers. I will be at the ring-side the night of the Munroe-Sharkey fight to see the result. Jeffries from all appearances is in good condition. He always looks a triffe heavy, but that is a good thing for him to work off when he begins training."
