

CASTELLANE LOVES COUNTRESS ANNA

His Counsel Declares Count's Respect and Affection for His Wife Are Undying.

DIVORCE IS FINANCIAL RUIN.

It is Desired to Place Him in Despicable Light Before World, Has Nothing to Say.

Paris, Nov. 8.—The hearing of the Castellane divorce suit was resumed before Judge Ditté in the palace of justice this morning.

Maitre Bonnet of counsel for Count de Castellane consumed less than an hour in concluding his argument for the count. He continued his criticisms of Edmund Kelly, the American lawyer of the countess, and persisted in his demand for an examination of the witnesses in order, he said, to permit of the case being probed to the bottom.

Counsel added that in the event of a divorce being granted the count will ask for permission to see his children two days each week and a month in summer, and that the countess be enjoined from taking the children to America without his consent. So far as money was concerned, nothing would be much altered by a divorce.

It would only mean, final financial ruin for the count. It was impossible for him to meet his outstanding obligations, amounting to \$24,000 a year. The remainder of his ancestral inheritance would have to be sold. If his wife desired to present him in such a light before the world he had nothing more to say. Nevertheless, it seemed only just that he should be reimbursed for the \$24,000 which he obtained by the sale of his share of the ancestral forest of Bussy and which was contributed to the household expenses.

Counsel concluded with asserting that he was convinced that the countess, if free to obey the dictates of her conscience, would yet consent to a reconciliation, and solemnly assured the court of the count's respect, esteem and undying affection for his wife.

Maitre Cruppi, for the countess, in reply charged the count's lawyer with seeking to divert attention from the issue at bar by making an unprejudiced and baseless attack on Mr. Kelly, who, counsel declared, enjoyed a standing in the United States and France which made his defense superfluous, he having been counsel for the American embassy in Paris for the past 25 years.

Maitre Cruppi read a letter from Mr. Kelly denying the charges made against him, and said that unless the persons named were introduced by the counsel of the count he would never know the people he had charged with having been bribed. He declared the documents to be forged, by which counsel charged, the count in July attempted to convince his wife that Mr. Kelly was concerned in a plot to accomplish his political ruin.

The court, after hearing the conclusions of the public prosecutor next

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week, will announce its decision, either for a divorce or for an examination of witnesses. The "creditors' cases," in which Count Boni, the Countess de Castellane and George J. Gould as trustee, are made joint defendants, was called after recess today. This suit, which is brought by six creditors, involves \$24,000.

Maitre Millerand, of counsel for the creditors, contended that the countess, under the regime of separation of property was responsible for her husband's expenses of the household. He spoke in an extremely sarcastic manner, saying that his clients were particularly glad to learn that the countess did not intend to fly to America.

Maitre Millerand ridiculed the attempts of opposition counsel to depict her as living in a state of poverty. The count, he said, had not squandered all her money. The countess should pay her share of the extravagances. In a single month she had spent \$120,000. The ceiling of her bedroom cost \$100,000 with furniture to match.

Among the other extravagances mentioned by counsel were \$200,000 for jewels, \$12,233 for horses, \$29,800 for automobiles, \$4,000 for Carous Duran's portrait of the countess, and so on.

The bills in the countess's name, there was a bill from a dressmaker for dresses and money advanced amounting to \$28,235 and for \$23,200 and another for \$15,750.

Maitre Millerand of counsel for the creditors did not finish his plea, and the case was adjourned for a fortnight.

JEROME POINTS OUT ERROR OF HEARST'S WAY.

New York, Nov. 8.—Dist. Atty. Jerome today made the following comment on the election:

"If Hearst had not undertaken to accept him and had made himself an integral part of the Democratic party, the result, in my opinion, would have been a powerful and important position in it. He did not take that course, however, and I don't see how he can become a candidate in the Democratic party again."

"The American people are always willing to forget and to forgive. Hearst can do much good yet. His papers have a powerful influence, and if he handles his will with good, wise and judgment in matters generally he can accomplish much good. He must abandon the whole idea of abuse of anybody and everything, and must confine himself to attacking in a clean way the abuses which he will then be forgotten and forgiven. He could be of service to the organization. He must decide his course, however."

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AN EAST SIDE FAGIN.

Harry Stein Convicted of Teaching Art Of Picking Pockets.

New York, Nov. 8.—Harry Stein, charged with being an East Side "fagin," was convicted yesterday largely on the testimony of an alleged pupil, Hyman Grossman, a boy of 15. Stein was remanded for sentence.

Stein is said to have had a school in which more than 100 boys were instructed in the "art" of picking pockets. Young Grossman told the court how the lessons were given and how he judged the method of stealing a watch.

CONANT ON BANKING.

New York, Nov. 8.—At the meeting of the New York chapter of the American Institute of Bank Clerks last evening, the question of currency reform was discussed by Charles A. Conant, author of "The Principles of Money and Banking." Mr. Conant declared that the country had long known the system of bank currency, which was originally only a war measure, like the issue of the greenbacks. Every other civilized country had a more scientific banking system, and it was time for the United States to deal with the question in a time of general confidence instead of waiting for the compulsion of panic and a paper money which did not diminish when the demand for it declined, might prove a serious menace to the security of our monetary system, he said.

Mr. Conant's remedy for this menace was the plan recommended by the chamber of commerce committee.

THE NAVY LEAGUE.

Would Teach the People Necessity for A Strong Navy.

New York, Nov. 8.—The Navy League of the United States held its annual meeting yesterday and finished up the day with a banquet held at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Gen. Horace Porter, president of the league, presided. In a short speech he said it was the purpose of the league to educate the people to the necessity of a strong navy for the United States. He said the dispatch which on several occasions had been shown the uniforms of sailors of the United States navy would cease if public opinion were in favor of the navy, and if its great use were realized by the country.

At the annual meeting arrangements were made for a general convention to be held in Washington next February.

THAW'S COUNSEL READY.

New York, Nov. 8.—Clifford W. Hartigan, counsel for Harry H. Thaw, yesterday said that he had experienced any difficulty in retaining associate counsel to assist him at the coming trial of his client.

"We are ready at any time the district attorney may call," said Mr. Hartigan. "I am not yet ready to announce the names of my associates but I will say one thing. Thaw's interests will be carefully safeguarded."

WANT HIGHER WAGES.

New York, Nov. 8.—Representatives of the Order of Brotherhood of Engineers and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers met yesterday at the Broadway Central hotel yesterday.

Grand Chief Harman of the Engineers' Brotherhood and assistant Grand Chief Cable were present. The discussion involved a complicated schedule of wages which the men have asked to have adopted by several railroads centered here. Replies from the railroads are expected today.

A LOVERS' QUARREL.

It Was Responsible for the Death of Two Girls.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—A quarrel between lovers, according to the police, was responsible for the death of Annie Hirbar and Rosa Stupka, domestics employed in the German hospital, who were found dead in their room today from the effects of escaping gas. The two dead girls, together with Aloisia Moyel and another girl employed in the hospital, occupied the same sleeping apartments. This morning when attendants went to the apartments of the four girls they found two of them dead and the other two unconscious and in a serious condition. From a letter found among the effects of the Moyel girl the police have come to the conclusion that while she was brooding over a disappointment in a love affair she arose during the night and turned on the gas in an effort to take her own life, but was unsuccessful. In a letter which was written to John Chamazoo the Moyel girl said that she was unable to stand the separation from him and that she intended to take her life. Chamazoo has been arrested and will be held as a witness for the inquest, which will be held next week. The Moyel girl, although still unconscious, will recover.

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CHAIRMAN BRADY GIVES OUT A STATEMENT.

Boise, Idaho, Nov. 8.—Chairman B. H. Brady of the Republican state committee today issued the following statement upon the results of Tuesday's election:

"We have now received sufficient returns from every county in the state to enable us to say that the Republicans will have 16 out of 21 members of the senate and 44 out of 41 members of the house. Gooding is elected by over 2,000 majority and the balance of the state ticket from 15,000 to 22,000 majority. We have vindicated the good name of Idaho and the people near given their unqualified approval of all the things done by Gov. Gooding to maintain law and order in this state. Mr. Borah will receive at least 57 votes out of 72 for United States senator and Senator Dubois will never again attempt to ride to victory on his hobby of Mormonism."

"It is only fair to state at this time that a large majority of the leading Democrats do not now nor have approved of Dubois' course in this matter, and in the next campaign will support the party lines. Idaho is normally Republican and conditions are such that it is going to continue to be so in many years to come."

It was found today that the majority in Fremont county is about 3,500 instead of 2,800. This raises his total majority to about 9,400. The Republicans gain the senate in Lemhi and two representatives in Kootenai, making their total 51 members of the legislature to 21 for the Democrats. Several of the latter are in doubt.

A WOMAN MURDERED.

Throat Cut, Head Battered and Towel Twisted Around Her Neck.

Starford Springs, Conn., Nov. 8.—Mrs. Harry Williams, about 50 years old, was found murdered in her home near here this afternoon. "Robbery apparently was the motive, and the murderer is believed to be a tramp. The body of Mrs. Williams was found lying near the house, with the throat cut, head battered and a towel twisted around the neck. Near the body lay a knife and a club. The woman died after a hard struggle with her assailant, who it is thought struck her down with a club and then cut her throat, after which the towel was wound about her neck."

Following the murder the man made a systematic search of the house for money, thoroughly ransacked the house and a trunk in an upstairs room had been broken open and about \$100 in money taken from it. Part of this money later was found on the lawn in front of the house.

The husband of the murdered woman, who had been away from home, discovered the body.

SHOT HIMSELF IN DIVORCED WIFE'S PRESENCE

Portland, Nov. 8.—At Oregon City this afternoon Ralph E. Benson, of the city, went to the office of George Brownell, who had just obtained a divorce for Benson's wife, in the presence of Mrs. Benson, Brownell and three other witnesses shot himself just over the heart, and he died. They are believed to be preparing the divorce decree when Benson entered his office.
