

MODERN METHODS OF GOVERNMENT

America Stands Ready to Assist
China in Their Adoption
By Her.

IMPORTANT EDICT PUT FORTH.

Parsons is Eventually to Secure Par-
liamentary Form of Government
for Chinese Peoples

Washington, Sept. 20.—The impor-
tant edict referred to in the *Political*
Item, relative to the establishment of
a council of deliberations, has been
in course of preparation for more than
six months. As in the case of Japan,
America is ready to lend every assis-
tance to China in adopting modern
methods of government and in attain-
ing to the rank of a truly civilized
state. There is reason to believe that
the decision of the throne to publish
the edict at this time was an imme-
diate result of the return to China of Sun
Chuan-fang Liang Ching, who spent the
best part of his four years' in Wash-
ington in devising plans for the in-
auguration of reforms in the adminis-
trative systems in China. While the
purposes of the edict is to secure a con-
stitutional or parliamentary form of
government, the Chinese people, in
full-fledged parliament. Intermediate
steps are provided for in the decree.
The most important is the creation
of a district attorney to administer
a decision of the court in the case of
any criminal offense committed by
any person in the service of the state.

AFTERMATH OF THE EDDY NEXT FRIENDS SUIT.

Concord, N. H., Sept. 20.—An after-
math of the recent suits of the "next
friends" of Mrs. Eddy, the head of the
Christian Science church, against those
associated with the leader in the man-
agement of her affairs, came today
when the trustees of a fund for the
benefit of her son, George W. Glavin
or Lead, S. D., Mary Baker Eddy,
etc., etc., etc., etc., sought the
advice of the superior court as to their
titles in regard to the fund, in view
of the effect of the recent suit of "next
friends" upon the condition of the
trust fund.

On Feb. 25, 1907, Mrs. Eddy estab-
lished a trust fund of \$125,000 for the
use and benefit of her son, his wife and child
alone, and the trustees of the
fund Frank C. Street and Irving C.
Tuttleton of Concord, and Archibald
McNeilson of Boston. Four days later
Mrs. Eddy's son, and one other "next
friend," filed a suit in equity against
Mrs. Eddy, which declared her incompetent
to transact business.

In July, Mr. Gove, through com-
plaint filed another suit in equity. In
which the party was set forth in re-
gards to the trust which had been es-
tablished for his benefit, and asked the
court to assume the guardianship of it.
Later this afternoon an answer to the
second bill in equity was filed with the
clerk of the superior court by the trustees.
They refer to a provision in the
trust deed which states that any
one or more of the beneficiaries under
the trust may contest or oppose to my
right still or the disposition of other
property by me, all right and interest
of such beneficiary or beneficiaries in
this trust found shall therupon and
thereby terminate."

MUNICIPAL LEAGUE.

Maj. Harry Mahood of Baltimore Elec-
ted President.

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 23.—Maj. Harry
Mahood of Baltimore was unanimously
elected president of the League of Am-
erican Municipalities.

The league was organized after se-
lection of Oregon for the 1908 conven-
tion.

TORPEDOBOAT DESTROYER CONTRACT AWARDED.

Washington, Sept. 20.—Secretary
today awarded the contract for the
construction of five torpedo boat de-
stroyers, provision for which was made
by the last Congress, and bids for
which were opened at the navy depart-
ment about a month ago. The follow-
ing were the successful bidders:

William Cramp & Sons, two ships at
\$65,000 each.

The Bath Iron Works, two ships at
\$65,000 each.

The New York Shipbuilding com-
pany, one ship at \$65,000.

The hulls of all these vessels are to
be on plans prepared by the navy de-
partment and the machinery on plans
prepared by the bidders. Turbine ma-
chines of the Parsons type are to be
installed in all the ships.
