Just as Many Dependent on Los An-

geles Charity as Ever.

Los Angeles, Jan. 15 .- The list of San Francisco refugees dependent on the Los Angeles citizans' relief fund is as large as it ever has been. Capt. F. Ed-ward Gray, secretary of the relief com-mission, says he is "puzzled to know when the stream of refugees will end." About \$2,000 a month still is being spent to relieve the necessities of the refu-
