WASHINGTON, 27.—An interesting
question in regard to United States
bonds has been decided by Judge Duran,
first Commissioner of Currency.
Mr. Fremont, of the City of Denver,
recently presented for redemption
three mutilated coupon bonds of \$1,000
each, which he said he had found in
Brussels in 1874. The first Comptroller
refuses to consent to their re-
demption on the ground that the
finder of lost notes is only entitled to
interest in them and simply holds pos-
session of them against all persons,
except the rightful owner, and that
the finder of the bonds acquired no
title therein as against the owner or
the government by which they were
issued, and cannot maintain an action
for their redemption. He further
holds, in regard to mutilated bonds,
that they cannot be redeemed unless
the parties presented are all the remain-
ers of the bonds; or, in other words,
that the mutilated parts must be mis-
takenly accounted for.
