BURDENS LIFTED SOMETHING NEW MILK QUESTION

Dairyman Eldredge Delivers Address Before Women's Civic League.

WHY MILK DOES NOT KEEP.

Fault Is Often With Housewife-Even Purest Product Contains Many Germs.

Among the lectures on timely topics instituted by the Women's Civic league was a most interesting one delivered Monday atternoon before the members of the league in Unity hall, by Ben R. Eldredge: the dairyman. Mr. Eldredge spoke on "Pure Milk," his address being in part as follows:

"It is impossible to get clean milk from a dirty cow; it is impossible to take clean milk out of a dirty stable; It is impossible to keep a clean stable in a dirty yard; good milk is clean milk and dirty milk is polson. The purest milk we can get has 3,000 germs to a cabic centimeter, or about a teaspoon-

ful. In three days, unless that milk is kept clean and cold, it will contain kept clean and cold, it will contain 25,000,000,000 gorms to the spoonful. Now 25,000,000,000 of germs for every spoonful of milk is enosigh to make anyone sick. The city or state cannot really inspect any dairy. One or two official visits a year do little good. The consumer is the only real inspector. If the public wants clean, pure milk it can really get it. Just let the public in-spect the farms and the dairies in per-son, and there will be no trouble with the milk whatever, providing that the public is willing to pay for pure milk. "Eight cents a quart will not buy pure milk at such a low price. One

pure milk at such a low price. One dairy I know of, the best one, charges 14 cents a quart for the milk and is is cents a quart for the malk and is losing money every year. The man who runs it and pays the expenses does so as a hobby, he is a millionaire, and hus a model dairy near Chicago. Now, here in Salt Lake, as elsewhere, the dairy man is blamed for the dirtiness and ignorance of the housekeeper. HOW TO REEP MILK. "The average family ice box is not down to 55 degrees. If rauges from 70 degrees down and in such an ice box, in a pail, crock or pan, milk will spoil in a short time. Milk can be kept perfectly sweet and good to drink for three weeks without the use of any preservative whatever-just keep it clean and cold. You can always tell how long it remains sweet; that is, of course, up to a week or two. "There has been more improvement in the dairies around Suit Lake the past six months than in all the half century and more before that. But the milk-buying public has not improved and in most mases of impure milk the fault is in the kitchen."

The plaintiffs in each case are the legal representatives of the heirs of O. E. Tart and Clint B. Leigh, who were killed in an accident on the company's property on Feb 22, 1907. It is alleged by the plaintiffs that a regligence was the cause of the acci-dent, while the defense outlined its case in declaring that both victims disre-garded all rules of common safety, that they were the self-invited guests of the company, and that they had been warned in regard to their perilous peri-tions just prior to the accident.
