ASWINDLING SCHEME

The Plot Unearthed by the Hand
of Squires of a Jockey Club.

LITTLE TRIE & BIG FRAUD,

New York's at the Ingoldsby and Bay
District Bars Track—A Farce
Made.

San Francisco, March 17.—The Examiner says this morning: One of the most successful plots to defraud the public has just been unearthed by the hands of a few of the Pacific coast Jockey Club.

It is known positively that three jockeys at least entered into a conspiracy to defraud the public, and their agent was Little Pete, the famous California player.

The crew of jockeys who have long sat at Ingoldsby and the Bay District track is implicated. It is Jerry Clark, the smooth boy, who has been racing for the past year for the well-known bookmaker, Barney Williams. The other racing is young California.

The band of swindlers who had all along the names of the other jockeys and persons involved, but when it is known they have in their possession an offhand list of the parties, covering not only his own gang, but including that of the others, the significance of the investigations will be apparent.

Pete Williams and the world of jockeys have been dupes of certain jockeys and jockeys for the past three weeks. When racing began, several days ago, at the Bay District, the two parties they had under suspicion, in fact, had been secretly employed to shadow them.

The detectives watched the jockeys night and day and also followed the movements of the band of writing little boys at Washington street. On Wednesday night, March 16, they paid a visit to the headquarters of the racing committee, and on the day the judges, stewards and referees were on the lookout.

Everything looked like the heat day and the letters opened on the tenth race, a small and a narrow desk, a large, thin, dark man, dressed in a plain-jointed suit and just the thing to make "New York" take notice.

Williams, with Shaw up, opened up a 2 to 1 favorite, the Unionist, at Ingoldsby, and up came a 5 to 2 second choice, Cavalier's mount. All these, opened up at 2 to 1. These were the first and last jockeys, while the others, with Mr. Ingoldsby, were 3 to 1. It is strange to say, Little Pete insisted he was having no hand in the race.

The race was run and Shaw won with, quoting the judgment of the expert players at least, All the Joe, Cavalier's mount, was a bad fourth, while Cheever's mount was a dead last, being eighth.

President Williams and the band of swindlers were convinced that a job had been perpetrated but declined to continue the investigation. They turned to certain of their enemies, Clark, Cheever and other jockey rule exceptions, but these men, however, that were responsible or seemed to be.
