THE GOVERNOR PETITIONED

With Reference to the Establishment of a District Court at Logan.

The following petition has been presented to Governor Thomas:

My Excellency, Arthur L. Thomas, Governor of Utah Territory:

Your petitioners, citizens of Utah Territory and residents of the Fourth Judicial District of said Territory, respectfully represent:

That a constitutional provision exists within the boundaries of the State of Utah, which authorizes the Legislature to establish districts and counties, and that the Legislature has done so.

That the Legislature has established within the counties of Cache and Rich, and that Brigham Young and his family are burdened with heavy expenses for removal, and that the Legislature has given no relief.

That the Legislature has enacted laws which make it difficult for the people to remove, and that they are compelled to abandon or forgo the privilege of the judiciary established to afford them.

That the district courts were held at Layton, the people of this country could attend court at a very small cost only, while the people of Cache county would be able to come from their homes and attend court at the expense of the people of Cache.

The criminal cases brought to trial and counties are presented at a much greater expense to the United States than to the people, which is very well known to all.

That the necessary expenses were much increased at Layton.

Therefore your petitioners respectfully ask that in pursuance of an act of Congress, entitled "An Act creating a Fourth Judicial District for Utah Territory, that your Legislature provide and establish two term each year, and that it be held at Layton, in Cache county, at the time and place of each time as you may deem best suited to the needs and convenience of the people and counties.
