Accused of Forgery.—F. H. Williams, detective of the Union Pacific Railroad, was arrested in this city last night, at the instance of the Sheriff of Hawkins, Wyoming. Williams is charged with forgery. He will be held by the police here, in waiting for a requisition which will take him to Wyoming for trial.

The Camera Obscura.—Mr. Wm.
