An Ingenious Artist.—Mr. C. K.

Savage returned last evening, from a short trip to the terminus of the track of the Utah and Northern Railroad. He took several views along the way, among others, one of General Connor's old battle field on the Bear River. To make the picture more natural and interesting, he induced 12 or 13 men to wrap themselves in blankets and lie around on the ground in various positions to represent dead Indians. The result was quite successful. Mr. Savage states that the railroad is five miles beyond Eagle Rock, where a magnificent iron bridge spans the Snake River, and that the track is being laid at the rate of three quarters of a mile to a mile per day. He speaks highly of the energetic labors of Superintendent George W. Thatcher, and the influence he has over his workmen.

Incendiarism.—Main Street had

a narrow escape from destruction by fire on Sunday morning. About 3 o'clock, watchman Bauger discovered flames up stairs in the empty building just south of Wallace Foulger's old stand. POSTAL AFFAIRS.

Notice of Domestic Postage.

Letters, the standard single rate, weight is 3/4 oz. averted.

Single rate letter throughout the United States, 3 cents.

For each additional 1/4 oz. or fraction thereof, 1 cent.

Drop Letters, single rate, 1 cent.

Newspapers and Pamphlets.—The postage on newspapers sent by mail at the office of publication.

Newspapers are not charged postage when sent from the publication office to subscribers in the country where the paper is published.

Single Newspapers, not exceeding one ounce in weight, sent to any part of the United States, prepaid.

Paid postage, unsealed, 1 cent per ounce.

Maximum weight of any package of printed or miscellaneous matter is 10 pounds.

Registered Letters and Money Orders.

Letters may be registered on payment of a fee of ten cents, in addition to the regular postage, but the government takes no responsibility for safe carriage or compensation in case of loss.

Rates of commission, in United States currency, charged for issuing International Money Orders, to be transmitted by the Postmaster at New York to foreign countries, as follows:
