### Local and Other Matters.

**Thermometer** 54 degrees F. in the shade at 1 p. m. to-day. Fine.

**Religious Services.**—Religious services at the New Tabernacle to-morrow afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock, and at the various Ward Meeting-houses in the evening.

**Go And Get It.**—The owner of a small pocket-book, containing a small sum of money, picked up on the street this morning, can obtain it on calling at the Historian's Office.

**Mill Creek Booming.**—The hot weather is causing the waters of Mill Creek to swell, and they are coming down with a great rush, but as yet have done no damage. This stream is rising earlier this season than formerly.

**Jordan Rising.**—We are informed that the Jordan is rising rapidly, with a fair prospect of damaging a large amount of adjacent farm land. Some of the land proprietors, whose property is thus endangered, are banking up and taking other precautionary measures.

**General.**—Present appearances indicate that Tuesday, Decoration Day, will be very generally observed as a holiday.

**Accident.**—Yesterday afternoon James Richards, while engaged in taking down the wooden awning at the Exchange Buildings corner, fell, breaking his leg, a short distance above the ankle. He was carried into the drug store and attended surgically, and was conveyed from thence to his home.

**Fraternal.**—This morning we were called upon by E. Conklin, Esq., correspondent of that popular journal "Frank Leslie's Illustrated." He is in the city for the purpose of obtaining material for the pages of that paper. Mr. Conklin was here about three years ago in a similar capacity.

**Change of Time.**—The Utah Southern Railroad Company have made some changes in their time table, to take effect on and after May 29th. No. 8 freight for Sandy will leave this city at 8:10 a. m., arriving at 7:30; and No. 5, freight for same destination, at 2:30 p. m., arriving at 3:45.

No. 4, freight will leave Sandy at 9:55 arriving in this city at 10:50.

**The High Water.**—We learn from County Supervisor Wayman, that a large amount of gravel has been washed around the Roper bridge, across the State Road, and that a number of men are at work, under Mr. Wayman's direction, clearing the gravel away, so that the course of the water may be unobstructed. As much water will let down the Roper ditch as possible, so that the quantity in the upper canal may be reduced as much as can be, but the body of water, in consequence of the heat, keeps increasing.

### Our Country Contemporaries.

Ogden Junction, May 26.

The Ogden and Weber rivers are both swelling considerably since the last two or three warm, or rather hot, days, and should the tide continue rapidly, possibly some damage may accrue to land and crops. To-day, at 10 o'clock, the little daughter of Mr. T. Bullock was buried at the cemetery in Ogden City. The death of this child was somewhat extraordinary, inasmuch as the circumstances attending it. We are informed that after being a short time in the child's bed, apparently, some days ago, but Dr. Condon, on examining the supposed corpse, advised the parents not to bury the child, believing as he did that life was not extinct, and that the case was merely one of suspended animation. After lying quietly, however, for sixty hours, the child finally died, and was buried as we have said.

### CORRESPONDENCE.

**Freeching.**—Lecturing Free and Co.—Secretary, Confusion, etc.

JOHNSONVILLE, Ind., May 18th, 1878.

Editor Deseret News:

Owing to the length of the days, and the short evenings, I have not held evening meetings lately, but have and continue to hold one or two services on the Sabbath, filling up the week days with freaching, and working more or less among the farmers, who are very much crowded with their spring work. Last week I was sent for to talk against us at a meeting we held at a school-house. When he came he proved to be a merchant, politician and auctioneer, with quite a gift of "gab." After the meeting I invited any one who wished to, to ask questions. This man asked one, when a friend of his suggested the propriety of his making a speech in reply to which I readily assented, which he proceeded to do, after the most approved style of "blood and thunder anti-Mormonism." He gave the crowd a description of all the deeds charged against the Latter-day Saints, from the "burning of innocent women in the Temple at Nauvoo, to the high handed outrage of plural marriage," winding up by warning the audience against allowing educated and learned disbelievers to deceive them with their sophistries.

After he had finished, I replied by first stating that I was born and raised a hoosier, on a farm, and that on the self-same day I had been making off corn ground all day for a gentleman then in the audience. He had so overdone the "blood and thunder" part of his speech that no one believed of plural marriage, and in reply to the statement that the "Latter-day Saints" had "burned of innocent women in the Temple at Nauvoo," I could only say that they who had opposed prophecy and prophets in all ages of the world had used the same argument, and it was now left with those present to decide whether we were nearest to the teachings of Jesus, or those who were engaged to fight against us.

After meeting, several came up and shook us warmly by the hand, and stated that they had opened their eyes to many things that they never thought of before, and that the result of the effort to bring us into trouble only increased the spirit of investigation that was already very prevalent among the people.

At another meeting, a Methodist exhorter succeeded in getting us locked out of the school-house, but as the night was pleasant, we spoke in the open wood to a large congregation of men and women, who gave close attention, and when, after the meeting, he made an attack upon us, advocating tar and feathers, so that, instead of fighting us, he was necessitated to contend with his own neighbors.

From the above it can be seen that we are encroaching upon the dominions of the Evil One, and that he is stirring up the spirit of opposition to prevent the people from reaching the fountain of truth.

By standing left for Canada on the 18th, to visit relations, expecting to return in this state in the Fall. Meanwhile I shall hold meetings hereabout and endeavor to do all the good I can.

The trees are just covering themselves with their foliage of green, and render open-air meetings very pleasant, and I shall try to hold as many as possible, though I can feel when alone the force of the reason why Jesus sent them "two and two," and that I need the inspiration of the spirit of the Living God to enable me to cope successfully with the darkness and prejudice that I have to contend with here, and that two Elders should always travel together, as witnesses and to bear each other's burdens. A wide field for preaching will exist in and about Salt Lake, and as the summer's work is over, so as to enable the people to turn out to evening meetings, and the young and old generation appear to be gifted with the spirit of investigation, and they all need preaching to, and gladly receive, without any great amount of trouble, and I shall try to hold as many as possible, though I can feel when alone the force of the reason why Jesus sent them "two and two," and that I need the inspiration of the spirit of the Living God to enable me to cope successfully with the darkness and prejudice that I have to contend with here, and that two Elders should always travel together, as witnesses and to bear each other's burdens. 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
