TO LIFT TROPHY

American Yacht "Vim" Takes
Another Race and Wins
The Cup.

AUK WAS IN SECOND PLACE.

**Germans as Usual Were Fighting For
 Position in the Rear
 Guard.**

New York, Sept. 10.—Twenty-eight con-
 testants finished in the long distance en-
 durance swimming race of the New York
 Athletic club from Travers island to
 Huckleberry island yesterday. The course
 in a straight line is 1½ miles but the

swimming distance is about two miles. "Hud" Goodwin finished first in 16 minutes and 2 seconds.

Marblehead, Mass., Sept. 15.—The Roosevelt cup, presented by the Eastern yacht club to inaugurate yacuting contests between Germany and America, was won today by the American yacht club, owned by Commodore J. L. Park of the American Yacht club of New York.
