## CHARGES ACAINST GENERAL WOOD.

Major Estes G. Rathbone Airs Them Before Senate Committee On Military Affairs.

### SPECIFIC AND IN WRITING.

Says That the General, While Military Governor, Took Presents From a Gambling Concern.

Washington, Nov. 20 .- Maj. Estes G. Rathbone, formerly director of posts in Cuba, was given a hearing today by the senate committee on military affairs, which is investigating the charges against Gen. Leonard Wood in opposition to his confirmation as majorgeneral. The committee was in session about one hour. Nearly the entire time was given to Maj. Rathbone, who reiterated the charges made several times before to the secretary of war, the senate committee on relations with Cuba, and in public statements following his trial in connection with Cuban postal frauds.

#### SPECIFIC CHARGES.

Maj. Rathbone filed specific written charges with the committee. He al-leged that Gen. Wood while military governor of Cuba had accepted money from the Jai Alai, which was, he said a gambling concern, and asserted that he had made a personal friend and boon companion of an ex-convict. He also charged him with giving instruc an entirely unconstitutional and un-A merican character to the

With reference to the charge that Gov.-Gen. Wood had exceeded his au-Gov.-Gen. Wood had exceeded his authority in giving instructions to the courts, Maj. Rathbone said that the general had pursued this course in the Cuban postal case when he (Rathbone) was under prosecution. This was, he said, in violation of an article of the penal code of Cuba, and in a manner prejudicial to the rights and interests of those under trial. He also charged of those under trial. He also charged Gen. Wood with authorizing the use of ex-parte depositions in the postal cases, a proceeding which, he asserted, is contrary to law and the principles of law, and in this case contrary to in-structions given by the secretary of

TOOK GIFTS FROM GAMBLERS.

Maj. Rathbone charged that in ac Maj. Rathbone charged that in accepting gifts from the organization commonly known as the Jai Alai, to which Maj. Rathbone said Gen. Wood has granted a 10-years' exclusive conversion. Gen. Wood violated the Fortker law, which prohibited the granting of franchises or concessions during the occupation of the island by the American authorities. He also charged that the acceptance of these gifts constitutes a violation of an article of the penal code of Cuba. Other charges were made against Gen. Wood as follows:

# OBLIGATIONS OF UNITED STATES.

Undertakes to Guarantee the In dependence of the Republic Of Panama.

#### CETS SOVEREIGNTY IN RETURN.

Commissioners Call on Secy. Hay and Express Satisfaction With Terms Of the Treaty.

Washington, Nov. 20. Although the entire Hay-Bunau-Varilla treaty has in substance been published, the Assoclated Press publishes herewith the text of the first five articles of the convention which have to do with sovereignty.

INDEPENDENCE GUARANTEED. "Article 1, The United States guarantees and will maintain the independence of the republic of Panama.

WHAT PANAMA GRANTS. "Article 2. The republic of Panama grants to the United States in per-petuity the use, occupation and control of the zone of land and land under waof the zone of land and hand under water for the construction, maintenance, operation, saitation and protection of said canal of the width of 10 miles, extending to the distance of five miles on each side of the center line of the canal to be constructed; the said zone beginning in the Caribbean sea three mark and extending to and across the isthmus of Panama into the Pacific isthmus of Panama into the Pacific ocean to a distance of three marine niles from mean low water mark, with he proviso that the cities of Panamand Colon and the harbors adjacent to said cities which are included within the boundaries of the zone above described shall not be included within

FURTHER GRANTS.

this grant.

"The republic of Panama further grants to the United States in perpetuity the use, occupation and control of any other land and waters outside of the one above described, which may be the one above described, which may be necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation and protection of the said canal or any auxiliary canals or other works necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operatoin, sanitation and protection of the said enterprise. The republic of Pansaid enterprise. said enterprise. The republic of Pan-ama further grants to the United States in perpetuity the use, occupation and control of all islands within the limits of the zone above described and in addition thereto the group of small islands in the bay of Panama named Perico, Naos, Culebra and Flamenco.

PANAMA EXCLUDED.

"Article 3. The republic of Panama grants to the United States all the rights, power and authority within the zone mentioned and described in arti-cle 2 of this agreement and within the limits of all auxiliary lands and waters mentioned and described in said arti-cle 2 which the United States would possess and exercise if it were the sovereign of the territory within which said lands and waters are located, to the entire exclusion of the exercise by the republic of Panama of any such sovereign rights, power and authority.

SUBSIDIARY RIGHTS.

"Article 4. As rights subsidiary to the above grants, the republic of Panama grants in perpetuity to the United States right to use the rivers, streams akes and other bodies of water within its limits for navigation, the supply of water or water power or other purpos-

water or water power or other purposes, so far as the use of said rivers, streams, lakes and bodies of water and the waters thereof may be necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation and protection of the said canal.

"Article 5. The republic of Panama grants to the United States in perpetuity a monopoly of the construction, maintenance and operation of any system of communication by means of canal or railroad across its territory between the Caribbean sea and the Pacific ocean." Pacific ocean.

PANAMA COMMISSION. Calls on Seey. Hay and at the White House.

Washington, Nov. 29.—The commis-sion from Panama accompanied by the Panama minister, M. Philippe the Panama minister, M. Philippe Bunau-Varilla, was received at the state department today by Secy. Hay. The exchanges, while informal, were most cordial, and were in English.

SATISFIED WITH TERMS. Dr. Amandor informed the secretary that the commissioners had carefully inspected the Hay-Bunau-Varilla treaty and desired to take this opportunity of expressing their entire satisfaction with its terms. Dr. Amador

assured the secretary that no time would be lost in its ratification by the Panama government. He then paid a tribute to the service which the Panama minister had performed in so promptly negotiating the convention. REPUBLIC'S FUTURE.

After these felicitations the secretary and the commissioners discussed the future of the republic. It was point-ed out by the minister that the junta felt that it must first accomplish the mission to which it was called by the ntire people of Panama, namely, ratiturn its attention to the equally im-perant though "less immediate" work of establishing a more detailed form of government. The secretary ex-pressed deep interest in the future of the new state.

Most of the cases treated, he said, showed no signs of improvement, though in a very few cases slight im-provement was noted. 


