California Bankers are Opposed to Free Silver.

The contest involves the question of the limitation of liability for damages done by the defendant's steamer Annie Faxon, being engaged in a trip from the southern end of Washington.

The verdict of guilty of arson against Mrs. Amelia Pitts, of Los Angeles, was returned yesterday after a trial of having set fire to her home, which she had rented. Her conviction was secured through reports of witnesses she had made, and these were corroborated by other evidence. The trial was adjourned to the tenth, and it is probable that she will be sentenced. Since her confinement Mrs. Pitts has taken no interest, her conduct having caused many to think that she was very weak, but would survive if she would take food.

The experience of many girls who work in New York, Cal., from San Francisco, who have been hired, they claim that their pay is increased, and they are now married to men without money and make a large sum. A number of the girls go to Father Garrigan of the Catholic church, who gives them a room, for food. They are mostly young, in a few cases not having a morsel of anything but bread for two days. They had grown to such a point that they could work no more, and they are now living on the charity of members of the church.

News from the City of Mexico, under date of October 1, says that Isaac de la Torre, Mexican minister to the National Irrigation commission at Alamos, has been received to that city, as follows: "The question for Mexico is whether the financial and economic resources of the extensive Mexican region will be used to develop the waterways of the Rio Grande and New Mexico continues, that region will be deprived of the essential means to ensure its prosperity. All the Mexican people are in the same boat. We do not object to the measures we are taking in Colorado and New Mexico, the waters of the Rio Grande, and the resources for irrigation, but do object to the way in which these waters by the way of that section for their excessive use. A bill has been easily drafted at, so far as the friendly relations of the two countries would strengthen."
