QUIET RESTORED IN TEHERAN.

Principal Streets Posted With Procla. mations Saying Constitution Will be Maintained.

Teheran June 25 .- During an audi ence with a number of deputies and others today the shah promised to pardon those who had been guilty of acts of aggressiveness against him, even the members of the political clubs He charges those who had fired upon the peaceful Cossacks with the responsibility for the bloodshed.

His majesty regretted that the state of anarchy superinduced by the late constitutional government compelled him to resort to severe measures and he declared that his only object was to banish the enemies of the crown and

QUIET IN TEHERAN.

GULET IN TEMPERAN. St. Petersburg, June 25.-A foreign office communidue based on the report from M. Hartwig, Ruesian minister to Persia, confirms the news that quiet has been re-satablished in Teheran. It states that the cabinet remains in pow-er and that the shah's position is be-lieved to be greatly improved. The Russian and British representatives at Teheran have taken cognizance of the introgues of Zill Es Sultan, the uncle of the shah, who has been warned to de-sist.

Although the official representations which have been made to the shah deal exclusively with the matter of the enfety of the Europeans in Persia, both *Afety of the Europeans in Persia, both Russia and Great Britain have hinted to him that he must uphold the con-vilution in order to save the throne. The shah has vowed the determination to save the national council. The communique admits that M. Hartwig played a leading part in the negotiations between the parties of the national council and shah, acting as intermediary.

Intermediary. The Russian minister has certified that the council is innocent of intri-gues against the shah.

TO MAINTAIN CONSTITUTION.

TO MAINTAIN CONSTITUTION. St. Petersburg, June 25.—Press dis-patches from Teheran under today's date say that order has been re-estab-lished and that the dity is quiet. The principal streets have been posted with copies of a proclamation by the shah announcing his intention of maintain-ing the principle of popular representa-tion and the constitution. These proc-lamations are practically identical with those issued shortly before the disor-ders broke out.
