EX-SENATOR BURTON

Says He Does Not Want a Pardon Because He is Innocent.

Topeka, Kansas, Oct. 18 .--- "I expect to start to St. Louis tomorrow or Sat-urday to meet the marshal of the St. Louis division of the federal court and accompany him to the Iron County jail and there begin serving

County jail and there begin serving the sentence of six months imposed upon me," said J. R. Burton, ex-United States senator, tonight. Mr. Burton came to Topeka today and tonight returned to his home in Abliene. He said he was here arrang-ing his private affairs, and that his visit had nothing to do with the pro-posed scheme to get him a pardon. "It would be foolish of me," he said, "to say that I would not accept a pardon, because everybody knows that I would have no more to do with its acceptance than I would have to for the match. its acceptance than I would have to do with my conviction. However, I will say that I do not want a pardon, for I am innocent of this charge on which I have been convicted. It is a matter of principle with me and want to be allowed to go to jail.

"Of course, if the department of justice wired that I may have a day or two to arrange my private affairs be-fore starting to St. Louis, I will take the time allowed, but unless I receive such word I will start at once. This has not come as a surprise to me, and I am prepared."

GEN. HERMAN STURM DEAD.

Denver, Colo., Oct. 18.—Gen. Herman Sturm, a hero of two wars, died today at the home of his son, in this city, aged 75 years. Commissioned a captain in the Indiana volunteers by Gov. O. P. Morton early in 1831 he was thereast in the Indiana volunteers by Gov. C. F. Morton, early in 1861, he was thereafter successively acting chief of ordnance, lieutenant-colonel of the Fifty-fourth regiment, Indiana volunteer infantry, colonel and brigadier-general of the Indiana state troops.
