WARNING TO VIOLATORS.

Mulvey Charged That Chief Sheets Had Acted in Bad Faith in The Matter.

A precedent was established by the city council last night, which, if followed in the future, will result in every saloon in the city being closed on Sundays. The council concurred in the action of Chief of Police Sheets, who refused to renew the license of Wineman & Metcalf, proprietors of the White House bar, until the case against the men charging them with keeping their saloon open on Sundays and selling liquor is disposed of in the police court. The license for the place expired yesterdey and after the council meeting last night Chief Sheets issued orders

last night Chief Sheets head of the second of the second of the second program of the sunday closing ordinance and will no doubt be very beneficial to the morals of the city. The rdinance provides that any person onvicted of selling liquor on Sunday, ordinance shall be denied a license for six months. When the matter was brought up last there was quite an argument about it.

MULVEY ACCUSES SHEETS.

Mulvey charged that the chief of police was acting in bad faith in the matter and that there was something back of his action. He did not under-stand why one place should be picked out by the chief and made an example of in such a manner when every saloon in town was doing the same thing, and argued that the matter should be re-ferred to a committee so that the men could receive a fair hearing. He said could receive a fair hearing. He satu that it would be a very easy matter for the chief to abuse his power in regard to refusing licenses and cause a finan-dal loss of thousands of dollars to the proprietors of saloons and put them out of business and he contended that the ordinance did not give him any such power without the sanction of the council. He moved to have it referred to the license committee so that the matter could be adjusted satisfactorily. matter could be adjusted satisfactority. Black moved that the action of the chief be concurred in. Hobday raised the point that the council could do nothing else but uphold the chief as his section was final. Holley was in favor of having the matter referred to the committee and declared that if the chief revoked the license of every sa-loon that was selling liquor on Sunday. chief revoked the license of every sa-loon that was selling liquor on Sunday, there would not be a saloon left in the city. Preece also favored referring the matter. He said that all the councilmen knew that the saloons all over the men knew that the saloons an over the city were open on Sundays and he did not believe in the chief singling out one saloon and making an example of it and allowing all the other saloons to re-

main open. WARNING GIVEN.

Martin was of the opinion that the chief should be sustained, as he had warned Wineman & Metcalf to keep closed, and they failed to heed the warning. The point was raised that the men had not been convicted yet, as the case had been continued until s the case had been commuted unti-an, 2. This did not change the senti-ment of the councilmen, however, and Jan. 2. when the motion to concur in the chief's action was put, it was carried by a vete of 11 to 3. Later in the meeting Wells intro-duced a resolution, instructing the mayor and chief of police to enforce the law in regard to closing the sa-loons on Sundays, and that their attention be called to the discussion of the subject by the members of the council in which it was disclosed that the vio-lation of the ordinance in that respect is general throughout the city.
