

SEEK AMERICAN INTERVENTION

Korean Delegates Hope to Secure it to Prevent Further Japanese Domination in Korea.

WILL BE SERIOUS UPRISING.

Prince Yi Says That Japan is Very Bitter Against the United States and Great Britain.

New York, Aug. 1.—Hoping to influence the American government to intervene and prevent Japan from obtaining further domination in Korea, Korean delegates to the Hague peace conference, arrived here today upon the steamer Majestic.

“I and my companions,” said Prince Yi, who speaks English, “represent the Korean government by authority of the emperor, but Japan used all her cunning to show that we appeared at the Hague without any authority. We blame our treatment in Holland entirely to the Japanese. Korea will never agree to Japanese domination, and while there have been no disorders, yet, unless something is done, there will be a serious uprising.

“We knew before we left Korea that Japan would force the emperor to abdicate. Japan seeks to drive us from our land and destroy our Kingdom. Korea has always been a peaceful nation. We have no guns, arms or powder, and we expect the American people to their fairness and justice, to interfere. The United States does not realize what Japan's policy is in the far east and what it portends for the American people. The Japanese adopted a policy that in the end will give her complete control over commerce and industry in the far east.

“Japan is bitter against the United States and Great Britain. You in America do not realize this, but if the United States does not watch Japan closely she will force the Americans and English out of the far east. It is my purpose to visit several of the large cities of the country to make my plea for my people, then I shall return to Korea, where death awaits me. The Japanese have passed an edict of punishment against me, and I am officially a dead man. The Japanese may kill me, but they cannot kill the cause for which I am fighting. The only way Japan can dominate in Korea is to kill all my people.

“Prince Yi is a dapper young man and dresses in European fashion. Mr. Sei said that his fellow delegate to the Hague, Yi Tomi, was so overcome when he learned that Korea would not be permitted to appear before the Hague tribunal, that he died of a broken heart.

“Prince Yi was deeply affected on hearing that 40 Korean soldiers had been killed or wounded while resisting an attempt of the Japanese to disarm the Korean army.

“The death of these soldiers,” de-

clared the prince, “marks the baptism in blood of Korea's final efforts to throw off Japan's domination. The Korean army will resist Japan's disarmament steps to the last and Korea, responding to a great national sentiment, will rise up and fight for her liberty.”

HARRIMAN AND FISH.

Radically Differ Over Ownership of Illinois Central Stock.

New York, Aug. 2.—E. H. Harriman and Stuyvesant Fish, whom Mr. Harriman ousted from the presidency of the Illinois Central, differ over the ownership of the stock of that road.

The trouble arose over a statement given out by Mr. Fish, announcing his position at the next annual meeting of the Illinois Central stockholders, in which he said Mr. Harriman owned only 10 shares of Illinois Central stock against 12,422 held by himself. When this statement was shown to Mr. Harriman, he said:

“I have been the largest stockholder in Illinois Central ever since I have been in the company and Mr. Fish knows it.” Mr. Fish, when informed of Mr. Harriman's statement, said the figures he had given were taken from the books of the company, and were correct.

STATE FORESTERS TO MEET.

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 2.—A meeting of forestry officers of the various states and territories of the Union which maintain forestry bureaus has been called by Gerald L. Hunt, state forester of California, and will be held in this city in September simultaneously with the fifteenth annual irrigator congress. The purpose of this meeting is to bring together the men charged with the administration of state forest laws for discussion of their mutual problems.

SKETCHING FORTIFICATIONS.

New York, Aug. 2.—Four American schoolteachers, who have arrived here from the Philippines via Asia and Europe, brought sketches of the fortifications of the Japanese. The American teachers were W. C. Moyer of Keats, Kan.; C. A. McKee of Indiana; Pennie Fisher of Hunter, Okla.; and E. M. Ellison of Greenville, Tenn.

Whenever they stopped in India or other British possessions, they declared they found Japanese busily engaged in making sketches of fortifications and harbors.

OCEANIC CO. SUED.

By Government to Transport Three Aliens Back to Australia.

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—The government has filed suit in the United States district court to compel the Oceanic Steamship company to return to the countries whence they came three aliens who were denied a landing here on account of having trafficked. One alien came from Australia and the other two came from Tahiti.

Since these men were brought here, the Oceanic Steamship company has given up its Australian line. For that reason it refuses to take the passenger to be deported back, claiming that the law provides that aliens denied a landing shall be taken back on boats owned by the company running to the ports whence the aliens came. As the company has no boats running to Australia, it contends that a compliance with the law is manifestly impossible. As to the other two, the contention is that they are not affected with trafficking.

MURDERED AND MUTILATED.

Oklahoma City, Aug. 1.—With ears hacked from the head, the trunk and one arm pierced with four bullets, teeth knocked out, the mouth bruised, and cloaked blood formed upon the lips, the body of Wilbur Gunreth, a barber who is supposed to have come to Oklahoma City a short time ago from Seminole, T. T., was found at 3 o'clock this afternoon three miles west of the city on the Tenth street road by G. F. Applegate, a farmer living near where the body was discovered.

This is the second body that has been found near Oklahoma City within the last week with the ears cut off and the police are working on the theory that a secret society, formed to wreak horrible vengeance on its enemies, is operating in and near Oklahoma City. A brother, Charles Gunreth, 535 East Sixty-third street, Chicago, has been notified.

CECILE DE WENTWORTH

Returns and Brings Her Portrait of the President.

New York, Aug. 2.—The Marquise Cecile de Wentworth, the American artist, who painted the portrait of President Roosevelt which was exhibited in this year's salon in Paris, has returned to this country for a holiday, and has brought with her the picture of the president. The marquise is the only woman, except Rosa Bonheur, whose works have been bought for permanent exhibition in the Luxembourg gallery, Paris. She and Rosa Bonheur are the only women painters who have been decorated with the cross of the Legion of Honor.

MOYER WILL NOT TAKE ANY PART

Says it Would be Ungracious for Him to Participate in the Haywood Celebration.

NOT YET PROVEN INNOCENT.

He Will Leave Haywood in Salt Lake City and Then Proceed Westward to Unknown Destination.

Denver, Aug. 2.—Chas. H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, co-defendant with William D. Haywood, secretary-treasurer of the federation, in the conspiracy charge growing out of the murder of former Gov. Steunenberg of Idaho, will not come to Denver to participate in the demonstration now being arranged for Haywood on his return to this city tomorrow. Although Moyer has been released on bail, he takes the position that it would be ungracious for him to participate in a celebration, the keynote of which is the innocence of another who once stood charged with the same offense that he (Moyer) is yet to be tried for. Acting Secy. Kirwin is authority for the above statement, and in addition says that Moyer will leave Haywood at Salt Lake and journey westward. Mr. Kirwin did not say what place Moyer's destination would be.
