PATENTS SMOKE CONSUMER. Mesars. John Devey. William Rich ns. J. T. Yates, and Walter Deve have patented a smoke consuming machine which is most successful in machine which is most successful in consuming coal, sulphur, zine and most all other kinds of smoke. Officials of the U. S. Smelter were examining the consumer here the other day and they were so impressed with it that they have made a proposition for the inventors to move it to Murray and try it on the smelter smoke. The smoke is taken out so successfully here that gas coming out of the separator will not blacken a wet glass, every particle of smoke having been removed after being forced litts the separator by a blower. The consumer or separator is very simple, the tank being filled with water in which is a simple revolving mechanism which separates the smoke from the gas, the smoke remaining in the water and the gas ascaping through a pipe on top, which caping through a pipe on top, which takes the gas back to the furnace. In addition to the value of the machine as a consumer there is no doubt the by-products left in the water can be used for making many srticles of commercial value. The large number who have seen the consumer are most favorably impressed with the success made.
