**Everitt & Seaman** petitioned for the transfer of the unexpired portion of their licenses at the Delta Saloon, First South Street, to Walter K. Conrad, who would continue the business at that place until the expiration of the license. Granted.

**The committee on improvements** to whom was referred the petition of W. W. Casper et al. asking the Council to reconsider their action adopting the upper canal route, and the remonstrance of E. H. Williams et al. against the reconsideration of said action, reported that they had carefully considered both petition and remonstrance, and had concluded that neither should influence the Council in its final action, and recommended that the entire matter be referred to the committee of the whole Council. Adopted.

**Bill of Samuel H. Hill**, for one No. 24 Fire on the Hearth stove, \$79, was allowed.

**The following appropriations were made:** To Dennis, Long & Co., for water pipe, \$1,274.77; to the Jordan and Salt Lake City Canal, \$20,000; to the waterworks contingent fund, \$2,000; to the street supervisor's contingent fund, \$1,000.

**The committee on enrollment** reported that "An ordinance relating to the city stray pound" had been properly enrolled, signed by the Mayor, and filed in the office of the city recorder.

**On motion, Mr. James Sheldermine** was appointed city stray poundkeeper.

**Adjourned for one week.**
