

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

TRAIL MEETING.—All who purpose taking part in the celebration of the Fourth are reminded of the meeting to be held in the City Hall at seven o'clock to-night, and give in your reports.

MR. SETH GREEN.—We are informed by A. M. Musser, Esq., that Mr. Seth Green, the Paicines, when on his way from the East to California, a few days ago, put up at the Hotel in the Weber River. He was found by a father in a barrel with but about one inch of water in it. The barrel is 2 feet high, and he must have been in it for some time before he was found.

Nearly a Big Fire.—Last night, about half past nine o'clock, the City Creek Foundry was discovered to be on fire. It appears that the workmen at the foundry had been eating yesterday, causing the wood work surrounding the cupola to become very much heated and ultimately to ignite. The watchman was at supper when the fire commenced and finding on his return, that he was unable to subdue the flames, he called for assistance. The fire was extinguished before much damage was done.

THE "WHEAT HARVEST" HAS GENERALLY COMMENCED.—This region of country and the prospects are that there will be an abundant supply for our wants in this district, unless some very foolish enough to disperse it to those who have no particular interest in the building up of our Dixie.

President Snow and the directors of the Utah Stock Co-operative have met last week at the hard ground on Short Street, which is situated about forty-three miles west of this place, and they report very favorably of the condition of the herd and its management, but as yet there is no dividend, as they have not finished appraising the value of the said stock. It is a contemplation to send a dairy in connection with the herd, as the Upper Valley, and a good range has been secured for that purpose. No doubt this will be a great asset to this region of country, as butter and cheese is rather scarce.

It has been under consideration by the Board of Directors of the Merchants and Manufacturers Co-operative Company, to assign the interests of these institutions, and there is every probability of it meeting the needs of the majority of the stockholders.

Bro. Joseph W. Young and Mrs. Miles P. Young have been on a tour through the modern settlements, and report favorably therefrom.

The telegraph line between St. George and Panguitch, which is under contemplation, will no doubt prove a success, as the settlements on the line are anxious to have telegraphic communication. Tenders have been requested for the supplying and putting up of cedar poles, and, when accepted, the line will be completed.

We have a tri-weekly mail from Salt Lake to St. George, but the mail cannot come in and leave the matter behind, and in case of arrivals appears to be regulated by the contractors independent of the public convenience.

A little boy about 10 years of age, the son of Mr. W. Carter, of this place, while driving up a span of mules on Sunday morning, one of the mules kicked at him, breaking his leg below the knee. Dr. Higgins being absent from the city, Bro. Higgins, who is a resident of this place, and the wife of the boy, are doing as well as possible under the circumstances. President Snow, now that he is leaving the house and driving around for a change of air, is gradually improving and gaining strength.
