SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 22.—Bayard

presented a petition for a law to prevent

ray discrimination.

Caution, of F. presented a large

number of petitions from iron work-

ers in different places of Pennsylvania

against a reduction of duty on

any manufactured goods below the

rates recommended by the tariff

commission.

Caution, from the judiciary com-

mission, reported favorably all for

the regulation of telegraph and

cable companies. It requires tele-

graph companies to receive dis-

patches from any person or from any

other line, and transmit the same

without favor or prejudice.

Plumb, from the public land com-

mission, reported an original bill to

prevent unlawful occupation of the

public lands.

Morrell called up his resolution

providing for night sessions begin-

ning this evening, his object being

to secure the best of the city

effort was to be made to pass the

tariff bill this session.

Beck said he was willing to sit as

early and as late as the chairman

of the committee (Chloris) desired,

but he objected to any limitation of

debate. The Senate was only on

the threshold of this bill. After

nearly two weeks' labor it had re-

ductions amounting to about \$300,

000, and increased (on the glass

schedule) of about \$748,000. In the

schedule, next to be discussed,

there was no reduction, but on the

contrary an absolute increase; and

unless this could be reduced, there

was no hope of reduction in the cot-

ton schedule. Accordingly, the best

calculation he could make, there

was an increase of nearly one mil-

lion dollars in the schedule last

named, and he believed the increase

in the metal schedule was even

greater than the estimate of the

bureau of statistics. Seventeen and

thirty-eight hundredths per cent

reduction under the glass sched-

ule, and under the metal sched-

ule, would be the objects of the

framers of this bill, especially in

this schedule; and they must make

up their minds to have it discussed,

often by them, the bill would un-

doubtedly pass, if not the Senate,

yet a worse one, which would be

agreed upon by a committee of con-

ference of four members.

These great outcry would be raised

that those who refused to vote

for the bill were standing in the way

of reform, and after the passage of

the bill, the question would be

upon a point of order, the amend-

ment would be ruled in order.

Caution, of Indiana, offered an

amendment providing that no fur-

ther original appointments of a chief

master of the navy shall be made,

but when vacancies occur officers of

the line shall be detailed to perform

the duties of paymaster without ex-

tra pay.

Knott also offered a substitute,

prohibiting future promotions to

any grade of the pay corps, but

the amendment was not taken.

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
