Governor in Tuolumne—Gov. John C. Cutler is addressing the students at the Agricultural college, at Lodi, today.

Returns from Vacation—Assistant Manager Tercyberry of the Commercial club has returned from his vacation, and is once more at his desk.

Harvest Entertainment—The annual harvest entertainment of the Union Sunday school will be held this evening, with a musical program, dancing and refreshments.

May Have Branch Here—An agent of the Denver Antiphlogistic company, commonly known as "Denver mud," is in the city with the idea of establishing a factory here.
