ORTHOGRAPHY.

Editor Deseret News:

I see in the Weekly NEWS of July 28th, a short treatise on Reform Spelling, by "Advance," which appears to me to be fraught with a great deal of hard sense and consistency. I do not think it is for me to say, but I would be glad to see this thing put right in my day. I have been sensible for many years of the facts of which "Advance" speaks, and have it in my mind that I pretty well comprehend how many letters or characters there should be, and what they should be, but what their form should be I could not say at present. I have manipulated out of old systems of stenography and mixed with characters of my own invention, different systems of characters or letters, but it appears to me that to use our present English letters and substitute as many more as are required to fill up the circle of our articulation faculties (which would be but nine), carrying and representing every sound and articulation that the organs are capable of expressing, would leave no possible chance for a misunderstanding as to what a letter meant or how a word should be sounded or pronounced. It appears to me that this system of letters or characters would more readily and naturally carry the change into universal practice than any entirely new invention of characters.

Of course in originating and arranging the nine new letters, it would require care and some painstaking to assimilate them to the old letters in all practical performances as much as possible, that is in their form, construction, etc. I see "Advance" is sanguine in the belief of the possibility and consistency of this change, and favors the idea of coming to it by degrees. That is, by dropping some unsounded letters in some words, etc. This might be the best and only way in which a change—but in this case, simply an improvement—could or can be brought about.

But if we really have a perfect knowledge of every sound and articulative expression that can be uttered, performed and expressed by the human voice or organs of speech, and that only nine more letters added to the old ones will fully and entirely represent all these vocal expressions, why not make the change complete while we are at it, if it can be made at all.

If these hasty hints find a place in your good paper, I may be induced at some future time to try to say some more on this important subject. And at present, perhaps for reasons best known to myself, I will give the very expressive *nom de plume*.

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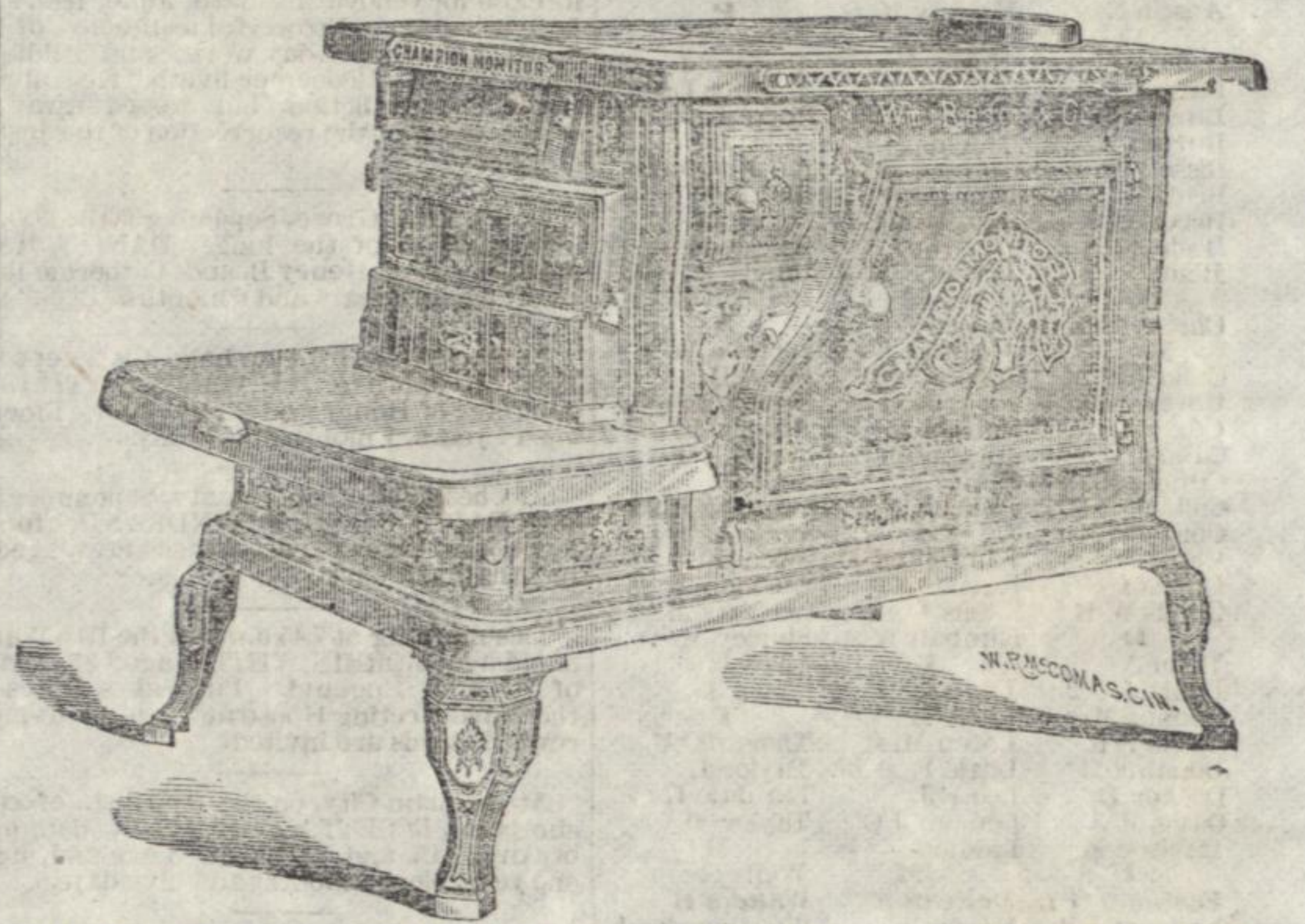
