The miners ate the last food on hand Sunday night, and Monday morning started for home. A blinding snow storm was raging, and the wind was bitterly cold. Upon reaching the top of the mountain near Miller's flat, the men by mistake went south instead of north, thereby losing the road, which they vainly sought all day. At night a fire was lighted, and snow was melted for drink, but the men had neither food nor shelhorses to bring in the men. but the men had neither food nor shel-

Early the following morning another Early the following morning another start was made, but again the wrong direction was taken, and men and horses floundered in from four to six feet of snow. About noon the skies cleared somewhat and right bearings were found. At night the lights in the valley were to be seen, but the nearly exhausted men were again forced to camp in the snow. During Wednesday the home of P. H. Madsen was reached, where the party was cared for, the host afterwards taking the men to town.
