DEATH OF MRS. MEAKIN. Taken With Headache She Lapses Into Unconsciousness and Dies.

Mrs. Anna Meakin died at 5 p. m. yesterday, after an illness of only a few hours. While her health had not been the best for several years, she was feeling unusually well Saturday and in the evening went out shopping. Early yesterday morning Mrs. Meakin was seized with a severe headache and shortly afterwards lapsed into unconsciousness from which she did not awaken.

The maiden name of Mrs. Meakin was Mayhew. Her parents, both deceased, having been of the same name. She was born in 1871. She is survived by her husband, Frederick O. D. Meakin, a contractor on the Salt Lake road, and four children, three sons and one daughter. The time and place of funeral have not been announced.

Ten minutes after arriving at St. Mark's hospital yesterday, John Benardos died from injuries received a short time before at Garfield. At 8:30 o'clock yesterday morning Benardos was thrown from a freight car upon which he was riding and was run over by another car. His right leg was severed below the knee and he was brought to the city, but it was evident from the first that his condition was hopeless. Benardos was 26 years of age and is survived by a widow and one child, who are in Greece. Undertaker Hall has charge of the remains.

TRUE INNARDNESS OF DAVIS DIVORCE

Last Straw in Deciding the Wife To Take Action in the Courts.

SEQUEL TO SHERIFF'S RAIDS

Prominent Mining Man Found in Colored Dive Championing the Immigrants and Resisting Officers.

From developments in the rather sensational Davis divorce case in which Martha J. Davis became plaintiff and Myron W. Davis defendant on Friday last, it seems that a specific cause for the filing of the papers does not appear in the actual proceedings.

The thing that Davis did, which was the last straw in deciding Mrs. Davis to take action in the courts, occurred in connection with the Sheriff Emery raids, early in October, upon the red light centers. When the force of deputy sheriffs appeared in the Willie Campbell colored resort at 5712 Commercial street, Oct. 7, they found Davis with colored inmates, in a beastly state of intoxication. He proceeded to curse the officers, and wanted to put up a fight in behalf of the colored queen of the house. This resulted in his arrest on the charge of resisting an officer. He was placed into a hack with the females taken into custody, and was taken to the county jail. Upon being tried before Justice Bishop he pleaded guilty and was fined \$100. He promptly came to the rescue of the colored woman again by appearing at the jail with \$300 in cash for her bail. Davis is a divorced man, who has been married to him for 10 years. After reading in the papers the accounts of the Davis escapade in connection with the tendorillon raids she lost no time in getting out papers praying for a divorce. Davis has valuable mining property in Bingham, but resides in Salt Lake.
