The Episcopal Convention.

NEW YORK, 10.—In the Episcopal Convention the Rev. Meyer Lewin, of Md., introduced, with a long preamble, the following resolution:

"Resolved, that the house of bishops concur in the following canon of the ritual of uniformity to be enacted:

"Sec. 1. The elevation of the elements in the holy communion in such a manner as to expose them to the view of the congregation, and the adoration is to be made, in or after the prayer of consecration, or in the act of administering, or in carrying them to or from the communicants bowings, crossings, genuflexions, prostrations, reverences, bowing down upon or kissing the Lord's table and kneeling, are to be done, and are to be done, or directed by the rubric or canon, and any gesture, posture or act implying such adoration, and any ceremony not prescribed as part of the order for the administration of the Lord's Supper or holy communion; likewise the use at any administration of the holy communion, of any hymns, prayers, collects, epistles or gospels other than those appointed in the authorized formula of the church, are hereby forbidden.

"Sec. 2. In all matters pertaining to the public worship of the church, to the ornaments, arrangement and appointments of the Holy table, and in everything connected with the performance of divine service, including the vestments to be used, about which there is no specific direction in the Book of Common Prayer, in the offices and ordinal thereto appended, or in any legislation, general or diocesan, of the bishops of any diocese, given in writing, shall be regarded as binding, to be followed and obeyed by every minister of that church."

The resolution was referred to the committee on canons. Several other resolutions were presented looking to legislation for the prohibition of ritualistic forms and practices, including a long memorial from the diocese of Virginia; these were referred to the same committee. The Rev. Messrs. Benedict, Hodge, and Messrs. Cooper and Bennett were appointed a special committee on the publication of a hymnal, and to inquire whether the instructions of the last general convention, in regard to publication, were carried out; the resolution was adopted. The chairman read a note from the Lord Bishop of London, enclosing a message by cable from the Church Congress at Brighton, England, inviting the American bishops and clergy to attend the next English Church Congress at Stoke in 1877. The chairman was instructed to send a proper reply to the Bishop of Chichester.

A resolution that the committees on canons, in view of the expediency of so amending the canons as to provide that the testimonial of a bishop elect be sent to the several bishops and diocesan conventions was referred to the committee on canons. A resolution instructing the committee on the standard prayer book, to inquire in all its editions of the book, the canon or musical clause in the psalter and canticles, as appointed by the Church of England, was referred to the committee on canons.

The Rev. Dr. Knickerbocker, of Minnesota, submitted the form of a new canon which he referred, with his motion to the committee on canons. It provides that the senior bishop of the church, on becoming a presiding bishop, or at any time thereafter, may resign the jurisdiction of his see, by sending a notice to that effect to all the bishops of the church, and in the event of his doing so, the treasurer of the general convention shall annually assess and collect, from each diocese, a sum equal to one dollar for every clergyman canonically connected therewith, and pay over the same, in quarterly installments to the presiding bishop, in his salary. The dioceses which have declined jurisdiction shall provide a residence for him during the rest of his life, and he shall be relieved of all other payments of his salary except the annual assessment. A board of trustees shall be appointed at each session of the general convention to manage the fund for the support of the presiding bishop, and to collect and invest the money for that purpose, and when the annual interest on this fund shall reach the sum of five thousand dollars, such interest shall be paid to the presiding bishop as his salary, and the assessments on the dioceses shall cease. The convention then adjourned till Monday.

SPAIN.

Shot for insubordination—Killed by an Explosion.

MADRID, 10.—Nineteen natives of Navarre, serving in the insurgent army, have been shot for insubordination. An explosion in a cartridge factory at Aspeña, killed eighteen persons.

General Llorente has refused to Lagoni, leaving a strong force of government troops near the fortresses of Lagoni. The Carlists withdraw to Primitives. The republican general Moriones occupies Tafalla and neighborhood. Many Carlists are coming into Barcelona and Tarragona and asking for an amnesty.

BRAZIL. Waiting for Reinforcements.

Rio Janeiro, 11.—No general engagement has yet taken place between the government troops and the insurgents; General Rivas, commanding the main body of the latter, is waiting for reinforcements before moving on the capital.
