

PROVO LETTER.

Progress in the Trial of French Davis—The Defense Begins.

Provo, Oct. 25.—The French Davis homicide case occupied the entire time yesterday in the First district court. The principal witnesses examined were Dr. Collier, four sons of the deceased, ranging in age from twelve to eighteen years, and a little girl six years of age. The three younger children were in the room where the deed was committed, but, strange to say, they had nothing to do with it. A fourth, full of weeping sobs and dried clothing, all from the northeast corner of the house, was brought in as evidence. The boy's hair is all circumscribed, but he points very strongly to the gift of the defendant. The prosecution has rested, and the defense states that the defendant is not guilty. The trial will be adjourned until November 11 for settlement of damages.

An Elder Suffers from Poison Ivy, COVINGTON, Cache County, Utah, Oct. 22, 1892.

Editor Deseret News:

Elder Henry H. Allen of this place returned home on the 22nd from Indian territory.

He was released on account of sickness. In May last he was poisoned with ivy; his effects were serious and his recovery several months. He was thrown into chills and fever, and this trouble associated with the poison caused him to return home.

He was about a mile over the year. During his absence he engaged in opening up the garden of his residence. Some Indians visited the Pathways, and harbored among the Cherokees and Choctaws. He enjoyed his mission very much, and did a great deal of good, especially in the prospects of the mission. This is the first of the Elders who has been poisoned with the poison ivy or poison oak; he is now improving rapidly.

PROF. ALLEN'S POSITION.

Da Journal Posted Out by an "Old-timer," Its Possible Native.

Professor C. E. Allen, Clark of our county court and the namesake of Delegate to Congress of the Liberal party, now just now to the lot of at least some Democrats styling themselves "Tuscaroras," and not least does he seem to be the idol of some Liberal Republicans, while a northern professor—"can't I think of name"—has been on the part of some the subject of much unfavorable criticism, in such circles being far from the idol of any one.
