

State Supreme Court Hands Down Decision Against Standard of Indiana and hepublic.



Entered Into Agreement to Fix Prices, To Control and Limit Trade and Prevent Competition.

Jefferson City, Mo., Dec. 23 .- The supreme court of Missouri handed down a decision this morning ousting the Standard Oil company of Indiana and the Republic Oil company from the state, forbidding them ever again to do business in Missouri and dissolving the Waters-Pierce Oil company of St. Louis.

In addition each of the companies is fined \$50,000.

The order dissolving the Waters-Pierce Oil company will become effective Jan. 15, unless the company on or before that date furnishes to the supreme court satisfactory evidence that it intends to operate as an independent concern. The court finds that the companies

conspired: One-To regulate and fix prices to re-

tail dealers. Two-To control and limit the trade in the refined products of petroleum. Three-To control, and limit and pre-vent competition in the buying and

selling of these products. Fourth—To deceive and mislead the public into the belief that they were separate and distinct corporations pur-

separate and district corporations pur-suing independently their business as legitimate competitors. The suit to oust the three companies was instituted by Atty.-Gen. Hadley fn 1905, and the evidence taken by a special commissioner in St. Louis and in New York has been before the state supreme court for more than a year The opinion was written by Judge Woodson. All seven judges concurred, and Judges Graves and Lamb wrote separate concurring opinions.
