Judge Rolapp in rendering his decision cited various points of law bearing on the subject, and said: "If courts were to vary this rule as to minors, it would encourage rather than discourage gambling among them. A minor close enough to his majority to deceive by his appearance an adult par-

ticeps criminis would feel encouraged to engage in gambling, because he would feel that if he won he would be the gainer, and if he lost, the courts would protect him to the extent of his losses. I think it of greater advantage that a minor should be made to understand that when he engages in unlawtal enterprises the court will not act as his friend, and when, as in this case such illegal act has reached publicity the proper thing to do is to have all the offenders punished as provided by


