ran one ahead of Parker, receiving 45 against Howell's 24. Varian and Moyle each ran even with Parker, receiving 44 votes against 25 each for Straup and Cutler.

## TEASDALE.

There were 47 votes cast, 30 of which went to Roosevelt, and 17 to Parker. Cutler, Howell and Straup received one less, while Moyle, Varian and Powers each gained one. Heavy scratching was done for Hayes (D.), over Chidester (R.) for judge of the district. He received 21 votes against 16 for Chidester. Another Democrat received a majority—Charles Snow for assessor, polling 37 against 19 for F. J. Weber, his Republican opponent. For constable and justice of the peace, the Democrats had no nominees.

## CANVILLE.

The Socialists received 5 out of 31 votes cast. Roosevelt was beaten by Parker, who polled 24 to Roosevelt's 2. Howell ran one behind Parker, the last vote going to Richard Schell. Cutler and Straup each polled 12, while Powers, Moyle and Varian each received 24. For assessor the Republican nominee, F. J. Weber, received 22, against 19 for Snow (D.). With this exception Democratic majorities were polled.

## Garfield County.

Henrieville—The Democrats barely polled enough to count. Thirty-seven votes went to Roosevelt, against five for Parker. Straight tickets were voted almost throughout, the greatest amount of scratching being for Precinct (D.), for sheriff, against Haycock (R.). He received nine votes to Haycock's 33.

## TROPIC.

Roosevelt received 66, Parker 43, Debs 7. The state ticket was voted about as the national. For county attorney, William Alva (D.) won over Goulding (R.), polling 71 votes against 48. A Democratic countable was elected, James Kenada receiving 72 votes against 43 for W. H. Halladay.

# PRESIDENT HYDE ANSWERS DUBOIS.

## Head of Pocahontas Stake Challenges

Proof as to Alleged Violation of Manifesto.

## REDUCES HIS FIGURES TO NIL.

Says That So Far as His Stake is Concerned the Senator's Charges Are Utter Falsehoods.

The following from the Pocahontas Tribune should comfort Senator Dubois in his hour of ignominious defeat: Editor Tribune—Now that the struggle is over and the result has been declared at the ballot box, I may perhaps be permitted to say a word without it being claimed that I am in any way attempting to interfere in politics. In the commencement, I sincerely beg the pardon of the long suffering public for what may be termed a revival of a distasteful subject, for even now I would not make a statement or attempt the briefest defense, if it were not as President Roosevelt said when accused by his opponent of blackmailing, "that the silence of self-respect might be misunderstood."

I listened to the flood of falsehoods, distortion and discreditation of facts that were uttered Monday night by Mr. Dubois with amazement that a man entrusted by his constituents with so high an honor as the senatorship, could so basely misuse it for the hurt of a misguided and misunderstood people; but as is the case with all falseifiers, however adept they may be, I did not listen in vain for the very lie which would proclaim his whole tissue of statements as false in their spirit and intent. Those who juggle with truth are always on dangerous ground and ought, therefore, to be very careful.

To his disciples and those who listened to him with any degree of belief, there could be no brief answer made to his general allegations that would suffice, but I take it that those things which come under your notice you are competent to pass upon, and I am content, speaking for my people, that the citizens of Pocahontas shall decide this matter, on which, above all others, they should desire a free and honest trial.

When speaking of the methods of the "Mormons" in performing their alleged plural marriages, which he claimed had been recently and are now occurring, he illustrated his point thus: "For instance, if a wife goes to Utah and is married in the Temple, and said further in these very words, 'And it is happening.' 'Here is a direct assault upon the 'Mormon' people of Pocahontas, for it is made general, and may, in the imagination of the believer, be applied to any individual desired, for in its scope no 'Mormon' of sufficient age is exempt. Now, I desire to say that in the next two years, during which time all
