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The following Bills were introduced by Hon. W. H. Hooper in the House of Representatives, on December 2d, 1867. They were read twice, and then were referred to the appropriate committees, and ordered to be printed.]

A BILL FOR THE ADMISSION OF DESERET INTO THE UNION.

Whereas the people of the Territory of Utah did by their representatives form for themselves a constitution and State government, republican in form, which was ratified by the people of said Territory at an election held for that purpose in pursuance of law, on the fourth day of February, anno Domini eighteen hundred and sixty-seven; and whereas the legislative assembly of the proposed State of Deseret did petition as follows:

To the honorable the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled:

GENTLEMEN: We, your memorialists, the members of the general assembly of the State of Deseret, respectfully state that our peculiarly isolated position, the well-proven inadequacy of a territorial organization to meet the wants of a numerous and rapidly increasing population, a disposition to lessen governmental expenditures, and an earnest desire to enjoy those inherent, inalienable and constitutional rights guaranteed to every American citizen, have induced the citizens of Utah to unanimously and constitutionally organize a State government, preparatory to their admission into the Union as the State of Deseret.

Wherefore your memorialists most respectfully solicit your honorable body to favorably consider this our petition, and, at as early a day as other important duties will permit, take action admitting the State of Deseret into the Union, on an equal footing with the original States.

And, as in duty bound, your memorialists will ever pray.

Therefore,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the State of Deseret shall be, and is hereby, declared to be one of the United States of America, and admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States in all respects whatever. And the said State shall consist of all the territory included within the following boundaries, to wit: Beginning on the thirty-seventh parallel of north latitude, where it intersects the thirty-second meridian of longitude west from Washington, or the one hundred and ninth meridian of longitude west from Greenwich; thence west on said parallel to the thirty-seventh meridian of longitude west from Washington, or the one hundred and fourth meridian of longitude west from Greenwich; thence north on said meridian to its intersection with the forty-second parallel of north latitude; thence east on said parallel to the thirty-second meridian of longitude west from Washington, or the one hundred and ninth meridian of longitude west from Greenwich; thence south on said meridian to the place of beginning.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That until the next apportionment of representatives, the State of Deseret shall be entitled to one representative in the House of Representatives of the United States.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That the said State of Deseret shall be entitled to the same per centum on the sale of public lands, the same land grants for the support of schools, for internal improvements, for a university, to provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts, for salt springs, for State buildings, and for other public purposes which have been, or which may be, granted to the State of Nevada.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That the people of Deseret shall provide by an ordinance, irrevocable without the consent of the United States, that said State shall never interfere with the primary disposal of the soil within the same by the United States, or with any regulations Congress may find necessary for securing the title in said soil to bona fide purchasers thereof. And that said State shall never tax the lands or the property of the United States in said State.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That from and after the admission of the State of Deseret, as hereinbefore provided, all the laws of the United States, which are not locally inapplicable, shall have the same force and effect within that State as in other States of the Union; and the said State is hereby constituted a judicial district of the United States, within which a district court, with the like powers and jurisdiction as the district court of the United States for the district of Nevada, shall be established; the judge, attorney, and marshal of the United States for the said district of Deseret, shall reside within the same, and shall be entitled to the same compensation as the judge, attorney, and marshal of the district of Nevada; and in all cases of appeal or writ of error heretofore prosecuted and now pending in the Supreme Court of the United States, upon any record from the supreme court of Utah Territory, the mandate of execution or order of further proceedings shall be directed by the Supreme Court of the United States to the district court of the United States for the district of Deseret, or to the supreme court of the State of Deseret, as the nature of such appeal or writ of error may require, and each of those courts shall be the successor of the supreme court of Utah Territory as to all such cases, with full power to hear and determine the same, and to award mesne or final process therein.

A BILL

TO CREATE THE OFFICE OF SURVEYOR GENERAL IN THE TERRITORY OF UTAH, AND ESTABLISH A LAND OFFICE IN SAID TERRITORY, AND EXTEND THE HOMESTEAD AND PRE-EMPTION LAWS OVER THE SAME.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, shall be, and he is hereby, authorized to appoint a surveyor general for the Territory of Utah, whose annual salary shall be three thousand dollars, and whose power, authority, and duties shall be the same as those provided by law for the surveyor general of Oregon. He shall have proper allowances for clerk-hire, office rent, and fuel, not exceeding what is now allowed by law to the surveyor general of Oregon.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That the public land within said Territory of Utah, to which the Indian title is or shall be extinguished, shall constitute a new land district, to be called the Utah district, and the President is hereby authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a register and receiver of public moneys for said district, who shall be required to reside at the places at which said offices shall be located, and they shall have the same powers, perform the same duties, and be entitled to the same compensation as are or may be prescribed by law in relation to land offices of the United States in other Territories.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That the Secretary of the Interior is hereby authorized to locate said offices of surveyor general and register and receiver of public moneys at some suitable place or places in said Territory.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That the pre-emption and homestead, and other laws applicable to the disposal of the public lands are hereby extended over said district.
