

**Died.**

In Beaver, Beaver Co., Feb. 25, Patriarch MARK ANTONY COOMBS, aged 65 years and 17 days.

Father Coombs was born near Isleborough, Maine, Feb. 8, 1802. At an early age he chose a seafaring life, and, as captain of a merchant ship, he sailed on every ocean, visited almost every civilized and heathen land, and finally circumnavigated the globe in a cruise of nearly three years duration.

From early youth he was an ardent lover of the Holy Scriptures, which he ever read with delight. He soon became convinced that the religion of the Bible was not practiced upon the earth, and that God had no Church organized among men according to the gospel plan, therefore he never attached himself to any of the pretentious sects of the day, although his parents and other ancestors, for several generations past, had belonged to the Quakers. Perhaps the principal cause of his holding himself aloof from the churches of the day was a dream or vision which he had, in which God showed him that He was about to set up His Church once more, and warning him to go westward in search of it.

In the year 1830 he abandoned the sea, and started for the then wilds of southern Illinois, partly to visit a brother who had settled in that region, but chiefly to search for the Church of Jesus Christ. Soon after his arrival in Illinois he married a Miss Maria Morgan, who bore him several children, five of whom are still living and reside in this Territory.

April 15, 1832, he was put ashore at Independence Landing, Missouri, from a steamboat, because he would not be as severe with the men in his capacity of mate, as the Captain thought he should be. He that day met with some of the Elders of this Church, was immediately convinced of the divinity of the Book of Mormon, and on the same day was baptized by Father Isaac Morley and confirmed a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He said to the Elders: I have been in search of this gospel all my days, and now that I have found it, I do not wish to postpone my baptism a single day. He was soon after ordained to the Priesthood and entered upon his labors as a preacher of the everlasting gospel, in which he took great delight and for which he suffered much persecution.

On account of circumstances over which he had no control, he did not gather with the Church until the year 1860. On his arrival in Great Salt Lake City he was welcomed by Pres. Brigham Young in such a fatherly manner that it left an impression of gratitude and love on his heart that he has carried with him beyond the grave.

On the 8th of October, 1862, he was ordained a Patriarch under the hands of Elders O. Hyde, John Taylor and George A. Smith, which office he magnified and honored to the last.

Let not those who loved him mourn over his departure, for of him it can truly be said, "he is not dead, but sleepeth;" and not only so, but his sleep will be short, his rest sweet and his resurrection glorious.—Com.

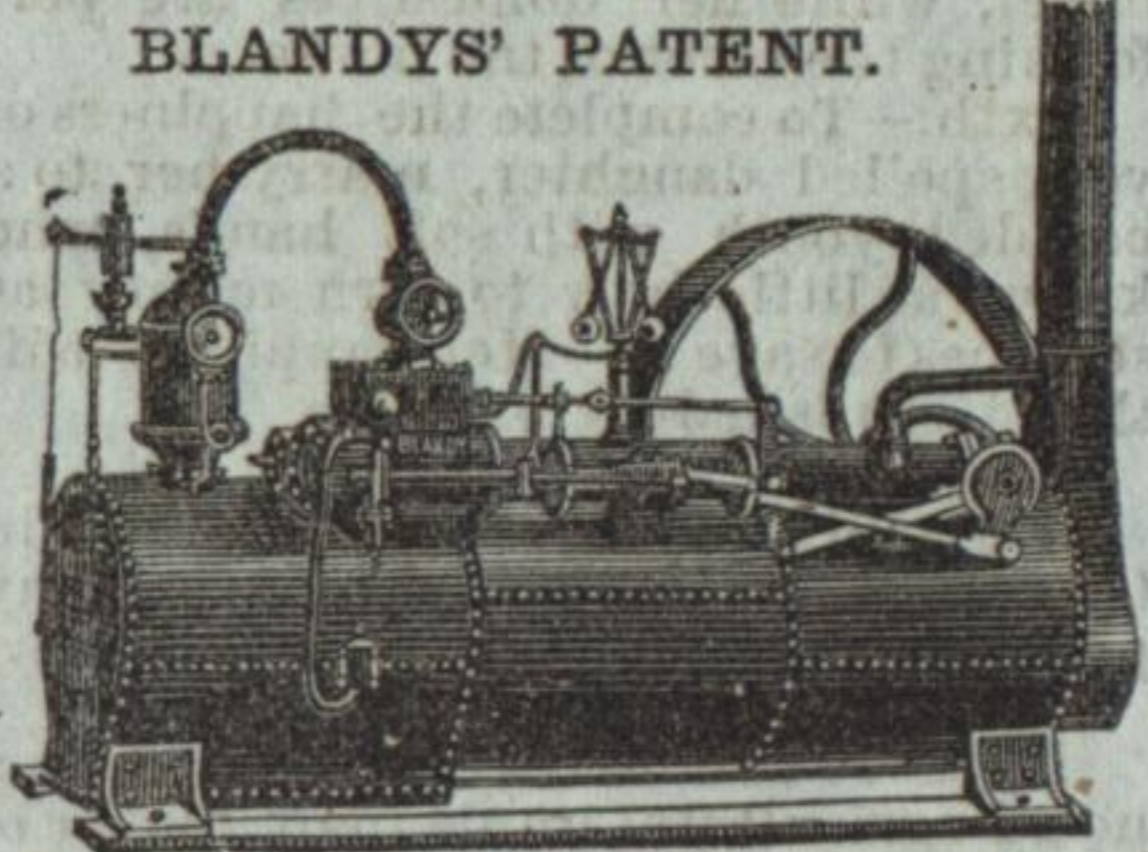
