REVEREND SCORES FASHION FOIBLES

Dr. Spurgeon Holds Up to Ridiculous Idiosyncracies of Devotees of "Style."

ORIGIN OF HIGH HANDSHAKE

He Declares Tight Lacing Leads to Consumption—Useless Habit of Swearing—Worship of Money.

Rev. Dr. Spurgeon scored the foibles of fashion last evening, in his lecture at the First Methodist church, to the entertainment of the large audience present. The speaker said in part:

"Speaking of following the fashion, I would like to say that the attempt of people to ape others is the cause of more financial trouble than any other thing. For example, a man has two stout legs, but one morning he wakes up and sees that his neighbor has a horse and buggy. Immediately he must have two horses and a carriage. It is this constant effort to outdo one another in the 'fashion' that causes no end of wretchedness.

"I have noticed that fashions are built to suit the occasion. A committee of a few gets together and combines a box of ribbon and a knot here and there, and we have a ladies' bonnet. Others I have noticed when the whole poultry yard is called upon to contribute to the hat. Then, again, there is the great flow of lace curtains that stream and sail about. It is all in the fashion, and the fashion must be followed.

THE HIGH HANDSHAKE.

"Over in the old country, when the present king of Wales, who was much given to handshaking. One day he had a boil under his right arm in such a place as compelled him to bring the arm over his shoulder and shake hands with his neighbor. Within a day the elevated handshake was the fashion, and the ridiculous fad was all the result of a boil under the Prince of Wales' arm.

"When the queen of England was Princess of Wales, she suffered from an illness which left her a pain in the back. The first time she appeared in the drawing room she assisted herself with a cane. Soon everywhere one saw dames walking with canes and aping as nearly as possible the attitude of the sufferer who was afflicted with a pain in the back.

Dr. Spurgeon ridiculed the long train. He related instances of how the train and the wearer had both come to grief, and held it to be a singular waste of money to put yards and yards of material into ridiculously long trains when many a poor child needed that material to protect its body from cold.

RESULTS OF LACING.

Dr. Spurgeon said tight lacing is one of the curses of the young womanhood. "Do you know what tight lacing leads to? Do you know that there are short ribs and long ribs in the human body, and that these ribs surround and protect the lungs? Well, when the tight lacing is applied there is a pressure, and that pressure leads to consumption in the end."

"Swearing is the most useless and foul habit. I find it indulged in here to a shocking degree. It never serves a good purpose, and never ban, on in the hands of a lady. In prayer does serve a good purpose. You will find that if a man swears throughout his lifetime, when the end is near he swears no more. I have no sympathy for the practice that sends the American heiress into marriage with a foreign nobleman. The farage is usually unhappy or a compromise. I can't understand what John D. Rockefeller would want to accumulate all his vast wealth for, if he were in the knowledge that it will be of little use to him. I have seen a man offered \$1,000,000 for a new stomach. Why, I'd rather live on black cheese and a glass of water than have all of Mr. Rockefeller's millions and a stomach.

In conclusion, Dr. Spurgeon advised young men to put their shoulders to the wheel, to set themselves on the back and set foot on the ladder and mount upward.

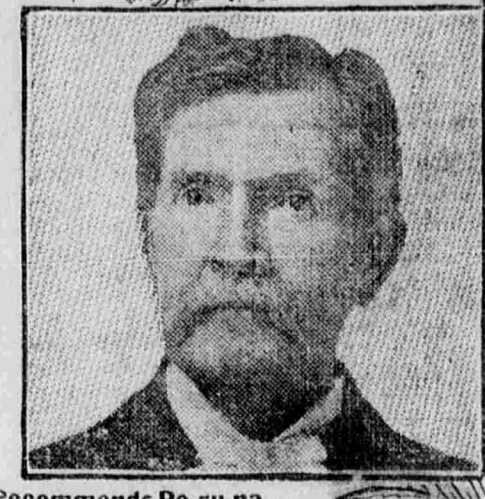

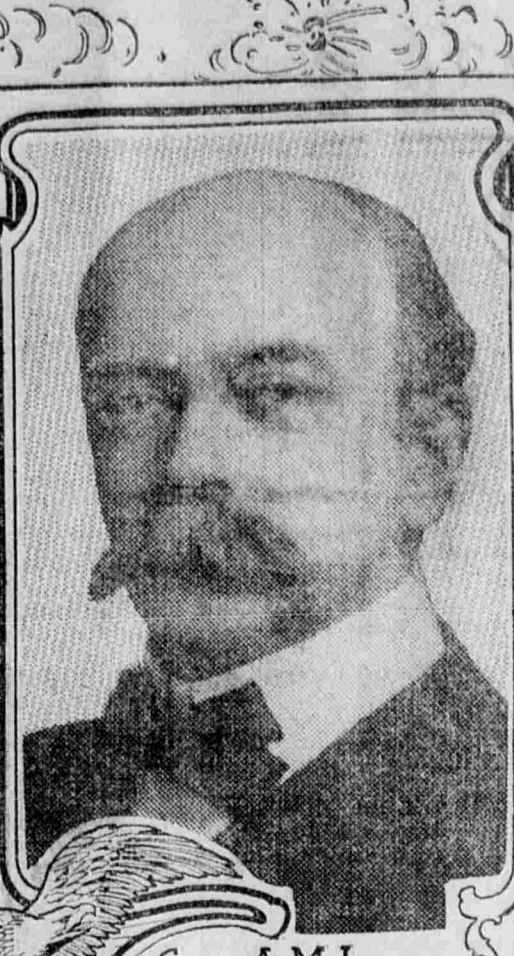
