OBITUARY.

All spoke of his excellent qualities, always faithful and ready to do good. A more obedient son could hardly be found. He was all the help his aged father had, who is very feeble. Mrs. Mansfield was not his own mother, his mother having died when he was young, but no one could feel more for a child than his father and living wife who had raised him. He had a feeling that he was going to die from the time he was hurt. He said to Sister Mansfield, "I am going to die, but am not afraid. I have never hurt anyone, but you will not be long behind me." He took her hand and kissed her, and said "you have been a good mother to me." He said to his father that no better man ever lived than he was. Before he died he said this is my last day, and remarked that if the Lord had permitted him to live he would have helped his father. He felt that the Lord had a work for him to do in the spirit world.

A sister living in St. George, had a dream about John, as follows: She saw John and two others together, five weeks before he died; and saw a light come down from above, and the Lord was in the light; and the Lord called upon John; and John told the Lord that he was coming. The Lord told John that he had a great work for him to do, and told him to come and do it, and after this she missed John.

There was more in the dream, but not pertaining to John. His parents feel keenly his loss, and there is not one living here that did not love him.—COM.

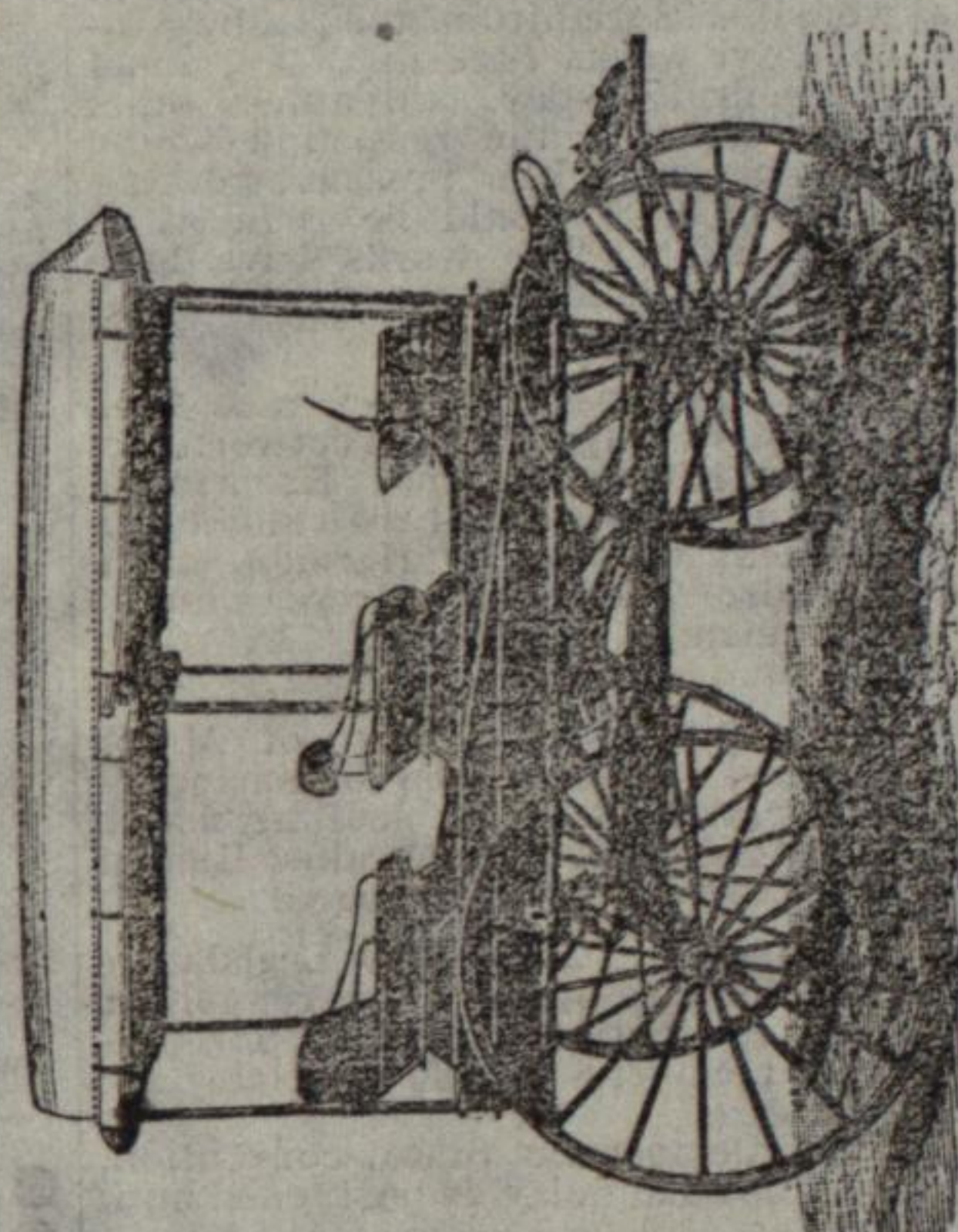
