YOUNG MAN MEETS SHOCKING DEATH

Joseph Lawler Loses Life by an
Unexpected Explosion of Pow-
der in Edson Tunnel.

COUNTY SCHOOLS CLOSE JUNE 3

Shupe-Williams Candy Co. Will Estab-
lish Cracker Factory—Funeral of
Mrs. Adam Eccles.

Ogden, Utah, May 15.—Joseph Lawler, a foreman for the Utah Construction company, was killed yesterday at the Edson Tunnel by the unexpected explosion of a blast. He had placed a blast of giant powder in the rock in the tunnel, had ignited the fuse and stepped away while it exploded. After waiting for a considerable time he supposed the fuse had gone out, and stepped toward the rock when suddenly the blast exploded, killing him almost instantly. His body was picked up by his fellow workmen and carried to camp. The sad news was telegraphed the company's officials in Ogden, who communicated it to his young wife, who was distraught with grief. His body will be brought and buried to Ogden this afternoon. Mr. Lawler was about 30 years of age, and a reliable, careful young man.

WILL SUPERINTENDENT WORK.

George Wheelwright left for Colorado last night where he goes to superintend the construction work to be done there for the Denver and Western Railroad company by Wheelwright Brothers Construction company of Ogden. The company was organized but a short time ago, but it has already secured several large contracts. The work Mr. Wheelwright will superintend is the putting in of a large number of culverts for the railroad company.

J. E. BECK DEAD.

W. B. Hughes, secretary of the Southwicks' Produce company, received a telegram yesterday evening conveying the sad news that his brother-in-law, J. E. Beck, had died at Sterrit, a small town near Bancroft, Idaho, of meningitis, after a brief illness. Mr. Beck was a young, strong muscular man, whom it was thought would live many years, and the announcement of his demise came as a shock to his relatives here. He was married only a short time ago to a sister of Mrs. Hughes. Relatives from Ogden left last evening for Sterrit to attend the funeral, which it is expected

will be held tomorrow at town.

Mr. Beck lived formerly in Utah county, where he is well known.

DEATH COMES UNEXPECTEDLY.

Edward Lander died very unexpectedly about 11:30 Saturday night at his apartments on Hudson avenue from hemorrhage, superinduced by consumption. Lander had been in Ogden for a considerable time and had been addicted to the morphine habit. He was living with a relative at a small house on the avenue. At about 11 o'clock he went to a nearby drug store and purchased some drugs. On the way back to his apartments he was seized with convulsions, and died a few minutes after arriving home. Dr. Dickson was summoned but was too late to render any assistance. His remains were removed to Larkin & Son's morgue, but no arrangements for the funeral have yet been made. Lander was born in Birmingham, New York, 42 years ago. He is said to have a wife living at Brigham City, but they have not been living together for a long time.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS.

The date for holding the Weber county school teachers examinations has been set for June 9 and 10 at the Ogden High School building. County Supt. W. N. Peterson has been appointed by the state board of examiners to conduct the examinations.

In former years the examination of county teachers has been under the control of the county superintendent of schools, but now it is the state who might appoint, but a new law went into effect this year, which makes the state superintendent responsible for the marking of all examination papers, and the issuing of certificates to teach in the county schools. The state board of education consists of one in each county to supervise the examinations, and for this year they have appointed Supt. Peterson. The list of questions, etc., is furnished by the state superintendent, and all examination papers are sealed up by the person in charge and sent to the state superintendent for marking.

SCHOOL COMMENCEMENT.

The commencement exercises of the Weber county schools will be held in the Ogden tabernacle, June 3. Prof. Byron Cummings, of the University of Utah, has consented to deliver the address to the graduates, who will number about 90.
